



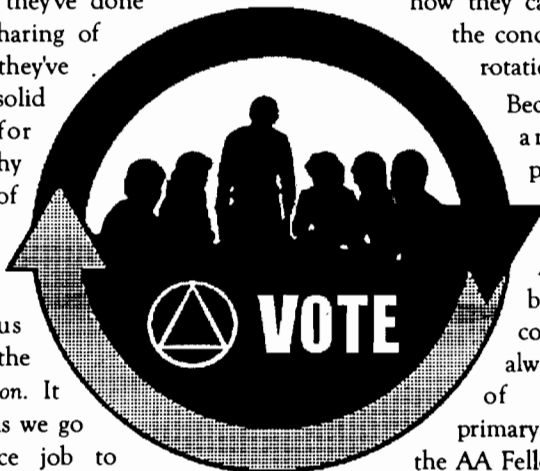

How can we continue to benefit from the experience of those who have rotated? The best way I can think of to benefit from their experience is to be certain that they are a part of ours.

## Whither the Traditions?

Here is your first heads up for a great Traditions Workshop for all of Sonoma County AA, hosted by the Up the Steps Group. We'll get together in March to hear four panelists with very long term sobriety share their experience, strength and hope about the Twelve Traditions.

As it says in the 12x12, "We are problem people who have found a way up and out," and this has never been more true. We deal with increasing complexities as a fellowship; multiple addictions, issues of dual diagnosis, ever younger members, and simply our swelling numbers. For many decades, the Twelve Traditions were routinely sponsored right along with the Twelve Steps, guaranteeing the strength and survival of Alcoholics Anonymous. Keep a lookout for the Traditions Workshop coming in March: it is these traditions that make the foundation of our fun and joy as a fellowship, too! ## SCIF Meeting

November 22, 2004

Tradition 11 was read by Dee, Concept 11 read by Susy.

**Intro of New Reps:** Sean from Wednesday Night Bodega Bay Fellowship, Regina from Sunday Clean and Sober, Elvia from Women's Perspectives, and Suzanne from Sober Sunday.

**November Birthdays:** Francis 9 years, Dave 4 years, and Robert 18 months.

Seventh Tradition was exercised.

Minutes of October 25, 2004 SCIF General Meeting were reviewed and approved.

**Registrar:** Deborah reported that she has begun entering meetings into the database and should have all meetings in by next month. 68 meetings signed in and 6 new reps signed in.

**H&I:** Mark reported that H&I meets on the first Wednesday of each month with an orientation for folks new to H&I taking place at 5:45PM followed by the business meeting at 6:15PM. The H&I 33<sup>rd</sup> Annual will be held in Galt April 22-24<sup>th</sup>, 2005. Contributions to the Pink Can from our local Area 22 for October 2004 amounted to \$2,426.52 and year-to-date contributions amount to a whopping \$32,311.00 from our local Area 22 alone.

## LIAISON REPORTS

**General Service:** Donna K. reported that Area Elections took place in Watsonville on October 30<sup>th</sup> and Local District 12 Elections have begun. The next Assembly will occur April 2 & 3, 2005 in Hollister—the first time Hollister has hosted an Assembly. Tucson, AZ will host PRAASA on March 11 thru 13, 2005—registration forms are available online at [WWW.PRAASA2005.ORG](http://WWW.PRAASA2005.ORG). Donna announced that she will be bringing a new General Service Liaison to Intergroup next month and reminded Intergroup Reps that if their group has a GSR, please allow the GSR to give their report.

**PI/CPC:** Dave indicated that they meet the 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday of each month at SR City Hall Lounge w/ speaker training at 7:30PM and Business meeting at 7:30PM. He explained that the function of this committee and that they have been

distributing literature to hospitals, police stations, senior centers and the like. Additionally, he indicated that there are currently 24 different (featuring people of a wide range of ages/sex/races/social backgrounds) public service announcements that may be heard or seen on local radio and TV. They are currently doing educational presentations at 12 +/- DUI classes per month and had a table at the health fair held at Santa Rosa Junior College last month.

**Bridging The Gap:** Susy indicated that the primary purpose of BtG is to introduce the newly released residents of treatment facilities to AA in their local community. BtG utilizes a list of AA volunteers to match up with the newly released AA newcomer and take them to their 1<sup>st</sup> meeting. All that is required to be a volunteer is 6 months sobriety. Last month, there were 8 local requests and 18 out-of-district requests.

## OFFICER REPORTS

**Intergroup Chair:** Kay. If a meeting announces in the meeting schedule that they are disability/wheelchair accessible, the venue must be accessible according to the law. If your meeting is listed as wheelchair/disability accessible, check with your landlord to confirm the location is in conformance with the code and review your listing in the schedule. Larry from Petaluma gave a presentation outlining the ADA/Disability Building Code requirements which is available for viewing at the SCIF Bookstore.

**Vice Chair:** Steve B. made an apology to Frances, an Intergroup Rep and then reported that he had 4 Reps at orientation.

**Treasurer:** John S. directed everyone to page 5 to review monthly financial report and indicated that, financially, Intergroup is rebounding. It was pointed out that the Year to Date net is \$9.00, not \$7.00.

**Bookstore:** Gloria announced that gifts items such as 2005 pocket calendars have arrived at the bookstore and she indicated she will be on vacation from December 21<sup>st</sup>-29<sup>th</sup>. Inventory will take place on the 30<sup>th</sup>—volunteers are invited to participate.

**Outreach:** Linda welcomed and introduced the new Outreach Co-Chair, Katherine.

Looking for a new service commitment in 2005? Your local PI/CPC (Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community) committee has many opportunities available both on the committee and as speakers.

Pays S.C.I.F.-related bills. Collects and records contributions from groups and prepares monthly financial statements for inclusion in the Newsletter. Accounting background and computer literacy are highly desirable.

Length of continuous sobriety - 4 years.  
Average monthly commitment - 15+ hrs.

## SECRETARY

Attends regular S.C.I.F. meetings and takes minutes. Delivers correct copy of minutes to Newsletter Editor. Attends Steering Committee meetings.

Length of continuous sobriety - 3 years.  
Average monthly commitment: 4-6 hrs.

## REGISTRAR

Maintains a list of groups and meetings available within the County. Keeps track on a monthly basis of which groups have representatives and how often reps

attend meetings. Works with Outreach Committee to contact those groups that are not active in S.C.I.F. meetings.

Average monthly commitment: 10-12 hrs.

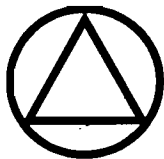

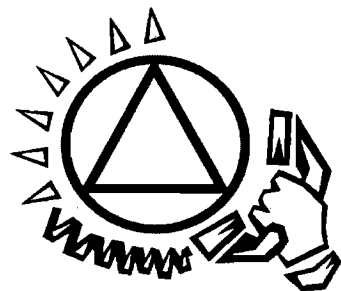
