AAWS GUIDELINES FOR NEWSLETTERS:

“Newsletters or bulletins published by central offices may include not only office news and events, but similar information about the groups and committees served by these offices (such as meeting times, openings of new groups, or changes of group meeting locations or officers). Frequently, material from A.A. literature is reprinted and discussed, and articles on subjects of interest to A.A.s are also published. Experience indicates that, as in most A.A. service activities, it is prudent to make a committee (rather than one or two individuals) responsible for the format, planning and content of the bulletin.”

A NOTE REGARDING ONLINE MEETINGS:

Just as in the physical rooms, meetings on Zoom feature resentments, ringing phones, and other disturbances. In fact, some groups, particularly women’s meetings are experiencing sexually predatory and violent behavior from meeting participants. While this, too can happen in physical meeting rooms, the anonymity of the internet provides a shield for the predators. Fortunately, while not possible to maintain absolute security, there are a number of features available to handle the more disruptive participants.

Secretary AND Group Admin/Co-Host

For starters, elect a group admin (co-host) whose role is to shoulder the weight of maintaining order during the meeting by managing the participants. This allows the meeting secretary to focus on the meeting, while the admin focuses on the room controls.

Meeting Participants Window

The Meeting Participants window offers control over most aspects of your meeting and those attending. Zoom has a 10 minute long video that is recommended viewing for all meeting secretaries and anyone who plans to co-host a meeting at any time.

Key topics include:

Removing Participants – connections from that user’s IP become banned

Locking the meeting room – nobody can enter the room while locked

Unmuted participants rise to the top of the list

Other Features

Consider enabling the Waiting Room for your meeting. You then play an active role choosing who to allow into the room through the participants list.

Consider disabling Join Before Host to keep users out before the host arrives. When “Join Before Host” is enabled anyone can enter at anytime.

Consider restricting In-Meeting Chat to reach only host only during the meeting. Many meetings open it up for fellowship after the meeting.

You can also take a group conscience regarding screen sharing, mute and unmute privileges, chat settings among participants and more.

It is unfortunate that we have a need to address this issue, but doing so and keeping online meetings going will do more to allow the sick and suffering alcoholic to find us than taking meetings underground will. Keep in mind our Responsibility Statement:

I am responsible...

When anyone, anywhere,
reaches out for help, I want
the hand of A.A. always to be there.

And for that: I am responsible.

MUSTS IN THE BIG BOOK (Part 2):

71. You will no longer be self-conscious or feel that you **MUST** apologize as though your husband were a weak character. (115)
72. These family dissensions are very dangerous, especially to your husband. Often you **MUST** carry the burden of avoiding them or keeping them under control. (117)
73. **NEVER** forget that resentment is a deadly hazard to an alcoholic. (117)
74. Your husband knows he owes you more than sobriety. He wants to make good. Yet you **MUST** not expect too much. (118)
75. Though it is infinitely better that he have no relapse at all, as has been true with many of our men, it is by no means a bad thing in some cases. Your husband will see at once that he **MUST** redouble his spiritual activities if he expects to survive. (120)
76. We **NEVER, NEVER** try to arrange a man's life so as to shield him from temptation; The slightest disposition on your part to guide his appointments or his affairs so he will not be tempted will be noticed. (120)
77. The family **MUST** realize that dad, though marvelously improved, is still convalescing. They should be thankful he is sober and able to be of this world once more. (127)
78. He can scarcely square the account in his lifetime. But he **MUST** see the danger of over-concentration on financial success. Although financial recovery is on the way for many of us, we found we could not place money first. For us, material well-being always followed spiritual progress; it never preceded. (127)
79. We know there are difficult wives and families, but the man who is getting over alcoholism **MUST** remember he did much to make them so. (127)
80. We have come to believe He would like us to keep our heads in the clouds with Him, but that our feet ought to be firmly planted on earth. That is where our fellow travelers are, and that is where our work **MUST** be done. These are the realities for us. We have found nothing incompatible between a powerful spiritual experience and a life of sane and happy usefulness. (130)
81. Whether the family goes on a spiritual basis or not, the alcoholic member has to if he would recover. The others **MUST** be convinced of his new status beyond the shadow of a doubt. Seeing is believing to most families who have lived with a drinker. (135)
82. State that you know about his drinking, and that it **MUST** stop. You might say you appreciate his abilities, would like to keep him, but cannot if he continues to drink. (141)
83. For most alcoholics who are drinking, or who are just getting over a spree, a certain amount of physical treatment is desirable, even **IMPERATIVE**. (142)
84. Though you are providing him with the best possible medical attention, he should understand that he **MUST** undergo a change of heart. To get over drinking will **REQUIRE** a transformation of thought and attitude. We all **HAD TO PLACE RECOVERY ABOVE EVERYTHING**, for without recovery we would have lost both home and business. (143)
85. While on the subject of confidence, can you adopt the attitude that so far as you are concerned this will be a **STRICTLY** personal matter, that his alcoholic derelictions, the treatment about to be undertaken, will **NEVER** be discussed without his consent? (143)
86. When the man is presented with this volume it is best that no one tell him he must abide by its suggestions. The man **MUST** decide for himself. (144)
87. An alcoholic who has recovered, but holds a relatively unimportant job, can talk to a man with a better position. Being on a radically different basis of life, he will **NEVER** take advantage of the situation. (146)
88. For he knows he **MUST** be honest if he would live at all. (146)
89. The old pleasures were gone. They were but memories. **NEVER** could we recapture the great moments of the past. (151)
90. I know I **MUST** get along without liquor, but how can I? Have you a sufficient substitute?" Yes, there is a substitute and it is vastly more than that. It is a fellowship in Alcoholics Anonymous. (152)
91. They will approach still other sick ones and fellowships of Alcoholics Anonymous may spring up in each city and hamlet, havens for those who **MUST** find a way out. (153)
92. But what about his responsibilities - his family and the men who would die because they would not know how to get well, ah-yes, those other alcoholics? There **MUST** be many such in this town. He would phone a clergyman. His sanity returned and he thanked God. (154)
93. He saw that he would **HAVE TO** face his problems squarely that God might give him mastery. (155)
94. Both saw that they **MUST** keep spiritually active. (156)
95. Though they knew they **MUST** help other alcoholics if they would remain sober, that motive became secondary. It was transcended by the happiness they found in giving themselves for others. (159)
96. God will determine that, so you **MUST** remember that your real reliance is always upon Him. He will show you how to create the fellowship you crave. (164)
97. We alcoholics see that we **MUST** work together and hang together, else most of us will finally die alone. (563)
98. A.A. **MUST** continue to live or most of us will surely die. (565)
99. Yet it is true that our first printing gave many readers the impression that these personality changes, or religious experiences, **MUST** be in the nature of sudden and spectacular upheavals. (569)
100. Though it was not our intention to create such an impression, many alcoholics have nevertheless concluded that in order to recover they **MUST** acquire an immediate and overwhelming "God-consciousness" followed at once by a vast change in feeling and outlook. (569)
101. I think our profession **MUST** take appreciative cognizance of this great therapeutic weapon. (571)
102. Any therapeutic or philosophic procedure which can prove a recovery rate of 50% to 60% **MUST** merit our consideration. (571)
103. They know that they **MUST** never drink. (572)

PI/CPC

Have you ever wondered how these weird misconceptions and myths about AA come up? Is it word of mouth? Is it really how some meetings run? If you'd like to be a part of setting the record straight about what AA is, and more importantly what it is NOT, come join us in PI/CPC!

Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community is a committee whose primary purpose is to educate people who might be potential alcoholics or professional communities that may have alcoholics among them, on what to expect in AA. We do this in different ways: distribute literature in places where we think alcoholics might be, such as assisted livings, libraries, doctor's offices, counseling offices, etc. We also make presentations at the request of certain facilities, largely high schools and DUI classes.

Personally, making presentations at high schools (and most recently middle schools!) has been the most rewarding commitment in AA for me. As a younger person, these high schoolers can relate to my story, especially since my alcoholism really got rolling around grade 10 & 11. They get to see that us AAs are not a glum lot, and that a productive, healthy, fun, happy, joyous & free life is available to them without the use of substances!

INTERGROUP TREASURER'S REPORT - FEBRUARY 2019

Central Office income for February 2020 includes \$4,979 from Group Contributions, \$100 from Group Insurance and \$9 Bank Interest for a total of \$5,088. Total expenses for February were \$3,278 leaving a subtotal of \$1,810.

The Bookstore income for February 2020 includes \$6,386 in sales and \$100 from Group Insurance for a total of \$6,486. Total expenses for February were \$7,280 leaving a net loss of \$793.

Overall we had a net gain of \$1,017.

Year to date our income is \$23,143, our expenses are \$22,229, leaving a net gain of \$914.

GENERAL SERVICE CORNER

The General Service Theme for 2020 is "A Vision for You." The Agenda Topics for 2020 and their Background Information are now hot off the press! Excitement is in the air as our General Service Representatives (GSR's) prepare to start holding sharing sessions with their fellowships to discuss these topics so they can bring an informed group conscience to our Delegate to take back to New York. Our Pre-Conference Assembly has been postponed due to current health conditions with the "Shelter in Place" order handed down. We will be having a virtual assembly now May 16th & 17th and those DCM's will be helping their GSR's find creative ways to gather their groups consciences! The next few months will be very busy!

I would like to take this time to bring attention to our District Committee Members (DCM's) and the role that they will play in this process. At this time, District 12 currently has 9 DCM positions which cover 11 sub-districts within Sonoma County. These DCM's provide information, support, and inspiration to many of our GSR's. Their role is invaluable to the process or providing our GSR's with all the tools that they need to do their service.

One of these tools is the monthly Sub-District meeting that are hosted each month by the DCM's for the GSR's in their Sub-district. They disseminate current information about the District, the Area, the Region, General Service in New York, and World Services. They provide guidance to the GSR's on group concerns, and other specific issue's that they may have. These concerns often become topics of discussion for all to learn from. DCM's are available to each GSR to support them at their group sharing sessions if needed. They discuss the 12 Concepts and 12 Traditions to assist the GSR's with their understanding of why we do business as we do.

Often our DCM's are the foundation which connects our GSR's to the circles of people within the General Service Fellowship and the many service opportunities that are available. Our DCM's are devoted to their GSR's, and it is a requiring position, but the great reward is to seeing the GSR's blossom and grow within their position as we work together to carry's A.A.'s message of hope to the alcoholic who still suffers. It is definitely one of the most rewarding positions that I have had the opportunity to serve.
