

COMMITTEE CHAIR POSITION DESCRIPTIONS

Election for the following positions will take place on February 25th.

Term length for all jobs is one year. Two consecutive terms O.K. Recommended length of sobriety for all positions: two years.

All Committee Chairs are required to attend SCIF Steering Committee and General Meetings.

ACTIVITIES CHAIR: Coordinates dances, summer picnics, and other activities and functions within Intergroup. Basically, puts the functions together. Must be able to delegate responsibility. Complete guidelines have been formulated for this service position. Average monthly time commitment: 20+ hours.

ALKATHONS CHAIR: Secures site for and coordinates organization of Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Alkathons. Requires ability to recruit subcommittee chairs, delegate to them, and coordinate their efforts. Draft budgets for all three Alkathons, shop for supplies, and maintain a spreadsheet. Knowledge of Microsoft Word and Excel is helpful. Hold regular planning meetings for the Alkathons. Average monthly time commitment: 10+ hours.

COMMUNICATIONS CHAIR/NEWSLETTER EDITOR: Collects articles, reports, and meeting changes for monthly Newsletter. Produces copy in format suitable for professional printing and delivers it to the printer. Maintains list of current subscribers. Sends link to online version to email subscribers. Requires familiarity with image and page formatting software or interest in and ability to learn such software. Familiarity with Microsoft Office is necessary, particularly Word and Excel, as is a working knowledge of the English language. Manages updates to website and meeting directory, as well as directory printing. Oversees Website Subcommittee. Average monthly time commitment: 20+ hours. **(The duties are being considered to be broken up into three positions: Communications Chair, Newsletter Editor, Website Chair.)**

OUTREACH CHAIR: Checks attendance for registered groups. Checks with groups to encourage groups to participate in the AA community and Intergroup, so finding volunteers to attend meetings is necessary. Average monthly time commitment: 6-12 hours.

SEMINARS CHAIR: Determines what workshops the Fellowship is interested in. Arranges for speakers and/or panels; contacts participants; sets up time and room for meetings; gets information into Newsletter; encourages participation. Average monthly time commitment: 6-10 hours.

TELESERVICE CHAIR: Oversees day-to-day operations of Teleservice. Conducts monthly Teleservice business meetings. Average monthly time commitment: 8-10 hours.

UNITY DAY CHAIR: Select a committee to help coordinate the event. Committee creates theme. Submit a budget to Intergroup steering committee for approval. Organize potluck, speaker panels, entertainment, raffle, creation and printing of flyers.

ICSC NOMINATING COMMITTEE: Three (3) members to be elected. Sobriety requirement – 2 years. Duties: "In April and October of each year, the Nominating Committee will present to SCIF not less than two (2) and not more than three (3) qualified individuals available to serve on the ICSC. Election will be by simple majority vote at that meeting."

(Cont. from page 1) I talked to someone about the second and third step issues I was having. I helped out in the kitchen. And, when it got too crowded, they sent me out to hear the speakers. I learned about how AA makes decisions, and how we all contribute to the process. The ideas for change come from individuals and groups around the country. Then, they become agenda topics that are discussed by everyone. Each group has the opportunity to make its voice heard through their GSR, who passes on their *group conscience* to the area Delegate, who then gets to discuss these topics with all the other Delegates at the annual Conference in New York. If there is substantial unanimity, new pamphlets may be issued, new books may be written, new outreach can take place, etc., etc.

You'll get to hear from our Delegate, Teddy B.-W., and from panels talking about the conference themes and how this whole process works; and then you'll get the opportunity to participate in mock sharing sessions, and experience how a group conscience reveals itself (hint: the more people who participate, the better it is). It's really quite a process: making room for everyone to be heard, and often resulting in surprising shifts in viewpoints when minority or dissenting views have the chance to speak up. The group doesn't have to come to one point of view. The GSR could end up telling the Delegate that the group had several thoughts on the subject. The point is that the Delegate needs to know how we all feel about the topics at hand.

Just in the last few years, as the result of ideas generated in our area and echoed around the fellowship, there are new pamphlets. They include topics on sobriety & mental health issues; atheists & agnostics in recovery; and a new pamphlet for Spanish-speaking women. There are updates to many other pamphlets that had become outdated. Check to see if your group stocks the most recent versions! They've been updated because the fellowship as a whole thought it was necessary. And, the new pamphlets are particularly important for people who may just be thinking about whether AA is right for them.

That's just literature! There are lots of other topics up for consideration as well. You and your group get to decide which topic you most want to discuss.

At the pre-Conference assembly, in April, GSRs and AAs from the entire area (stretching from Monterey to the Oregon border) will get together to share their group consciences on the agenda topics. Also, the fellowship will decide whether to ask the General Conference to start work on a fifth edition of the Big Book, or introduce new literature on meditation?

These are my two favorite General Service events of any year. And they're right here in Santa Rosa, this spring! It's never too early to take part. AA values the input of all members — new and old. Often, new members have insights that people who've been around a little longer might not think of.

General Service has been one of the best parts of my recovery, and I hope you'll give it a chance, too. Also, we have the best potluck north of the Golden Gate Bridge!! -- Ann R., GS Newsletter Editor
