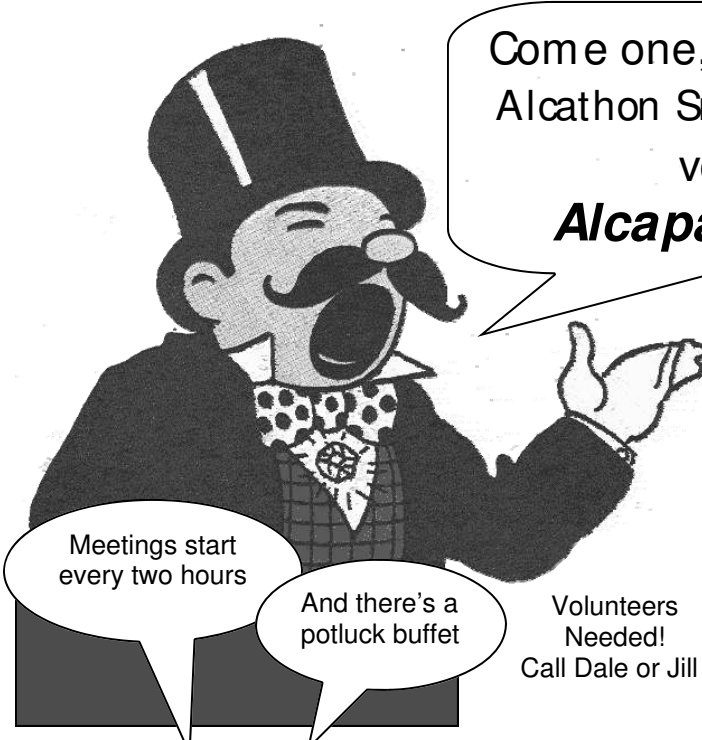

OFFICER REPORTS:

CHAIR: Diane W. The Sept. 29th inventory went well. Volunteers counted the merchandise twice and then enjoyed pizza from Mombo's. The Unity Day committee meeting agreed to allow Bookstore merchandise to be sold. Donna L. and Nan B. volunteered to assemble a display to show the services under the umbrella of Intergroup. Literature will be available at the table. Diane asked for volunteers to staff the table. Over the next two meetings, SCIF officers will give a brief description of their job in preparation for the election of new officers in January.

VICE CHAIR: Tim P. The new rep meeting is at 7:30. He reviewed what is covered at this meeting.

TREASURER: Larry O. Group contributions in September were \$5,378. Total group contributions so far are \$44,096 this year. The total for 2006 was \$48,000. The Bookstore lost \$339, but this may be the result of a new inventory calculating system. The Pirate Dance lost \$90. Teleservice expense was lower because the AA Hotline ad did not appear in the Press Democrat in September, so we got a \$249

credit for October. Larry recommended raising the prudent reserve to \$30,000 from \$25,000 because of cost of living/abundant funds. ICSC will discuss this topic further.

SECRETARY: Nan B. Laurie E. pointed out that her full name was printed under the H&I report. The minutes were approved after this error was noted.

REGISTRAR: Susy E. There were 366 meetings per week in Sonoma County last month, 156 were represented at Intergroup last month making this a 41% representation.

BOOKSTORE: Gloria P. A lot of items are being discontinued, and what they have of these items has been marked down. New price lists have been updated. There is an opening for a volunteer every other Thursday from 10am to 2pm. Diane noted that on October 8th Gloria completed 12 years as Bookstore manager.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

ICSC: Rich S. ICSC met twice in October and discussed detailed inventory reports and price changes. Inventory levels should go down as they get rid of overstocked items. They discussed the operating reserve and prudent reserve and will be reviewing this further over the next month. They discussed improvements needed at the Bookstore.

Matt M. nominated Steve B. for the ICSC. He has 10 years of sobriety, three years of H&I work with Catholic Charities and Sutter Hospital, 3½ years of General Service work and he has been Bridging the Gap Liaison. He has been in business for himself for 30 years. Business experience includes construction and retail software.

ACTIVITIES: Laurie E. The New Years dance will be at the Vet's and will be called Silver Starry Night. Black tie or suits for men is encouraged.

ALKATHONS: Dale E. He needs volunteers to hold 4-hour shifts at the Alkathons. There will be two people on each shift. The next Steering Committee meeting is Wed., 11/14 at Starbuck's on Farmers Lane. Call Dale if your meeting is interested in doing a meeting at the Alkathons.

PI/ CPC Report

In this space over the next few months the Public Information/ Cooperation with the Professional Committee - PI/ PC - will be providing the Fellowship information on the wide variety of services that we provide in Sonoma County. This is in addition to distribution of AA meeting schedules and literature to hospitals, police stations, libraries, senior centers and a wide variety of health and social services organizations; participation in health fairs; and frequent presentations at DUI classes.

TELESERVICE: Dave R. There were 200 fewer calls than normal because of the missing Press Democrat ad. There are open shifts 8 – 10am Tuesday and Wednesday. They need a recording secretary.

LIAISON REPORTS:

BRIDGING THE GAP: John B. The purpose of BTG is to introduce AA to newly released residents of treatment facilities by taking them to their first meeting. See the newsletter for the monthly meeting. BTG had 30 contact requests in October, 16 local, 7 outside the district, and 6 outside the area. They had one local request from an outside institution.

GENERAL SERVICE: Lauralyn C. The Fall Inventory Assembly was 11/3 in Watsonville. The District meeting was 11/5. District 12 archivist, Larry, is looking for older items. Lick and Stick for folding the newsletter and fellowship was 11/8 at 6pm on Newanga Ave.

HOSPITALS AND INSTITUTIONS: Mark V. The H&I Business meeting is the first Wednesday at the Bennett Valley Rd Senior Center at 6pm. New reps meeting at 5:30.

PI/ CPC: Nick R. PI/ CPC sends speakers into schools and other community gatherings to educate the public on what AA is and what AA is not. They put literature in libraries, police stations, hotels, jails, etc. They need volunteers. They meet the 2nd Wed at City Hall.

SOCYPAA: Sean M. Sonoma County Young People in AA is for anyone with room to grow. The Bookstore has updated SOCYPAA meeting schedules. They have two business meetings a month at 1551. Montgomery Drive and have filled 33 of their 36 available positions.

SPANISH INTERGROUP: Elvia P. Spanish Intergroup sent a liaison, Sylvester, to SCIF. The 33rd annual Spanish Speaking convention is coming up in Orange County. Spanish Intergroup needs SCIF meeting schedules and dance flyers. They have one Spanish speaking women's meeting in Rohnert Park attended by three to five women.

ACCESS SONOMA COUNTY: Jamie T. ASC continues to request completed accessibility surveys from groups. They will have a table at Unity Day. They are taking inventory next month. They are compiling a data base of material in different languages for visitors to our area.

CACHE CREEK: Mark V. They just had their first Steering Committee meeting for the 21st annual Cache Creek event

next June 21 and 22. There will be flyers at the Alkathons.

OLD BUSINESS:

Discussion ensued on the subject of the Policies and Procedures ratification. Four groups reported highly in favor including the Higher Power group, Fresh Air group, Tuesday Night Women's Perspective and a Saturday morning group. Came to Believe group wanted to continue further discussion. Sober Sunday had a split decision to ratify. A clear majority of reps voted to vote on the motion and voted that 2/3 majority would be needed to pass it. The vote tallied 41 for, 11 against and 17 abstained. 2/3 majority was declared and the motion passed.

NEW BUSINESS:

Four people volunteered to staff the Intergroup Unity Day table. In preparation for January elections, three officers gave a synopsis of what their job entails:

Diane W. reported the Chair presides over the General meeting and Steering committee meeting and makes the agenda for both meetings. They attend the newsletter meeting and have a seat on the ICSC. They make sure groups are heard, encourage participation from groups and make sure they are appropriately represented in Sonoma County. They need a general knowledge of the AA service manual, Robert's Rules of Order, and must have at least four years sobriety. Average monthly time commitment is 8 – 20 hrs.

Tim Perkins described the Vice Chair position: To support the Chair in the performance of his or her duties and to fill in for the Chair should they be unavailable. The Vice Chair should be informed on the matters of Intergroup history and procedure and current and pending business. The Vice Chair customarily runs the New Rep orientation meeting before the General meeting of Intergroup and gives the summation at the end of the meeting. He may be asked to liaise with other committees. The monthly time commitment is 15 hours a month more or less and the sobriety requirement is four years.

Larry Ono reported the Treasurer should have some business, finance, and computer experience. They collect and deposit group contributions, pay bills, do accounting and report to the Steering committee and General meeting. They work with the Bookstore manager and bookkeeper. They make sure all incoming mail is handled in a timely manner. The monthly time commitment is 30+ hours. Four years of sobriety is required.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

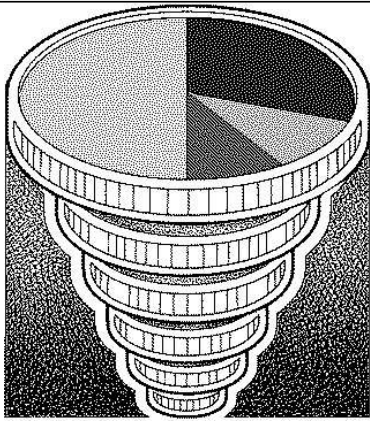

IN A HURRY? DON'T LIKE TO READ MUCH? Then this is for YOU!

How It Works (A two-thirds shorter version...and my apologies to our founders)

Be open to following AA's suggestions and almost anyone can stay sober. We've got to be honest, though. Too bad for those who cannot; but it's not their fault. Maybe they were born that way. Even mental cases can recover if they can be honest.

Listen to recovery stories. We've got to give up our old thinking and do what others have done to stay sober. There are no shortcuts.

Alcohol – cunning, baffling, powerful! Without help it will kick your butt. Help always comes by finding a God of your choice, the only One more powerful than alcohol.

Time to throw in the towel. Ask God for His protection and care. Working the 12 Steps with complete honesty will lead you to recovery.
