DISTRIBUTION OF EXCESS FUNDS

At the October 2009 General Meeting the groups approved a formula to calculate, annually, an appropriate level for the Sonoma County Intergroup Fellowship's prudent reserve.

The motion read as follows: "Sonoma County Intergroup Fellowship, Inc. shall maintain a prudent reserve of six months' operating expenses, excluding 'cost of sales'. At the end of each year the Treasurer shall calculate the new prudent reserve amount based on the past twenty-four months' operating expenses divided by four and make the necessary accounting adjustment which will be published in the annual financial statements."

Now it is time to turn our attention to the question of where to distribute funds which are in excess of the prudent reserve and which are not identified to any stated A.A. purpose. The ICSC proposed and the SCIF Steering Committee approved the following motion for presentation at the November 2009 General Meeting: "At the end of each year, after the prudent reserve is calculated and adjusted in accordance with the approved formula, any excess funds (operating reserve) shall be distributed:

40% to Sonoma County General Service (District 12) 30% to California Northern Coastal Area (Area 6) 30% to A. A. General Service, New York"

The recommended percentages resulted from discussions that local services should be funded first, and that any excess funds at the District or Area level of General Service will ultimately be contributed to General Service in New York.

JOB DESCRIPTIONS:

SCIF CHAIR

Responsibilities are to conduct the monthly Intergroup General Meeting and the Steering Committee Meeting, prepare agendas for those meetings and research background information for issues that may arise at those meetings. Experience conducting business meetings according to Robert's Rules of Order, SCIF business procedures, and AA Traditions is important. The sobriety requirement is four years.

SCIF VICE-CHAIR

Responsibilities are to welcome new representatives to Intergroup, assist the chair and be able to step into that position if need be. The sobriety requirement is four years.

SECRETARY

Requires showing up at two meetings each month – the SCIF General and Steering Committee meetings. The secretary listens carefully, takes notes, and then types them up for SCIF Officers and Committee Chairs. The sobriety requirement is three years.

TREASURER

The job consists of depositing group contributions, paying bills, overseeing the bookkeeping and financial reporting and serving as a member of the ICSC. The treasurer attends the 4th Monday SCIF General Meeting and the 2nd Monday SCIF Steering Committee Meeting. The 2nd Monday meeting is preceded at 6:30 PM by the monthly ICSC Meeting which the treasurer also attends. Minimum of four years sobriety and an accounting background.

REGISTRAR

Maintains a list of groups and meetings available within the County. Keeps track on a monthly basis of which groups have representatives, meeting changes and how often reps attend meetings. Works with Outreach Committee to contact groups that are not active in S.C.I.F. meetings. The sobriety requirement is three years.

Sonoma County General Service wants to thank Sonoma County Intergroup Fellowship for allowing us this column in your Newsletter. California Northern Coastal Area, 06 is a link in the chain of communication from our groups to the General Service Conference, our General Service Office, and our 2 Corporations, A.A.W.S. and The AA Grapevine. At the Area, we were informed on 2 important items: One that Group Contributions are down, probably due to the tough economy we are in. Some Home Groups have decided to make their contributions on a monthly basis instead of a quarterly or semi-annual basis. I must take this opportunity to also inform you that contributions to our local GS are also down. Please help your groups make informed decisions about their contributions, and remind them that we are all responsible in supporting our Fellowship. The second topic reported at Area also involves our 7th Tradition, and comes from the Trustee's Finance and Budgetary Committee through our GS Office. For a couple of years now, our Fellowship has been discussing the topic of fully funding our G.S.O. with only the voluntary contributions of A.A. members and groups. We know that we have been relying on literature sales to make up the shortfall for years. They are asking for more input from our Fellowship, specifically in the form of 2 questions:

- 1) If we continue to use literature profits to fund services, should there be a limit?
- 2) If there is a limit how do we continue to pay for services if there is a shortfall in contributions?

You will start to hear your GSRs asking for your help and input on this topic. Please make time for them at your business meetings. In Service, Steve d


BRIDGING THE GAP

Bridging The Gap (BTG) is a subcommittee of General Service whose purpose is to "bridge the gap" for people in prisons, hospitals and treatment facilities and the first AA meetings they attend upon release. We match interested people with AA members of the same sex, roughly the same age and in the same neighborhood, to take them to their first AA meeting upon release.

BTG needs volunteers in all areas but mostly Petaluma, East County, West County and the Windsor-Healdsburg areas. Our Committee is looking at ways to improve communication regarding our services to volunteers and the AA community in general and would welcome your input at our monthly meeting. We are also in need of enthusiastic and committed members who can take on several open committee positions including recording secretary and volunteer phone coordinators. We would like to create an outreach committee that goes out to different meetings in our district and gives a short talk on what BTG is, what a volunteer does and how anyone can help in this simple but vital service.

Our monthly meeting is held on the third Tuesday of the month at the SCIF bookstore located at 750 Mendocino Avenue. New volunteer orientation is at 6pm and our regular business meeting follows at 6:30pm. All are welcome at both meetings. The only requirement is that you bring a fun attitude and a desire to help a still suffering alcoholic.

"The first 50 years of our Fellowship, I am convinced, have probably exceeded the expectations of our founders, even though we have not yet achieved their grand vision and hopes.

"Since I was assigned the title "Fifty Years of Caring and Sharing in Correctional Facilities," and since my loving invitation was not specific as to which 50 years, I want to address the nest 50 years in addition to the first 50 years.

"This day is not only the first day of the rest of our lives; it is also the first day of our Fellowship's next 50 years. Today [1985] there are 450,000 adults in prison in the United States, plus 25,000 in Canadian prisons. There are at least that many people in our jails. Now, if we related these figures to five years ago when we had 300,000 adults locked up, what does it predict for the next five years? Fifty years?" [Part 1 of 1985 address by W.J. Estelle, Jr., then Class A Trustee, Texas]


