Elections of SCIF Officers will be held on Monday, Jan. 28, 2013 during the Intergroup Business Meeting, 8 p.m. at St. Luke Lutheran Church. The positions to be filled include Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Registrar.

SCIF Officer Job Descriptions: Term length for all jobs is one year. Two consecutive terms are allowed. All officers are required to attend the SCIF steering committee meeting the second Monday of the month and SCIF general business meeting the fourth Monday of the month.

Chairperson: Presides over monthly Intergroup and Steering Committee meetings. Maintains direct communication regularly with other Intergroup officers and committee chairpersons. Serves on ICSC. Must have general knowledge of A.A. Service Manual, Robert's Rules of Order and SCIF business procedures (for conducting Intergroup Business Meeting). Serves on the ICSC committee. Length of sobriety = 4 years. Average monthly time commitment: 8-12 hours.

Vice-Chairperson: Supports Chairperson in his or her duties; and fills in for Chairperson should he or she be absent or unable to perform that office. The Vice Chair should be informed in these matters: 1) Intergroup history and responsibilities; 2) current and pending business; 3) Chair's Rules - that is, parliamentary procedure as informed by A.A.'s Twelve Traditions. In addition, the Vice Chair runs the new rep orientation before the regular business meeting, gives the summation at the end of the meeting, and may be asked to liaise with other committees or to fill in for absent officers/committee chairs. Length of sobriety = 4 years. Average monthly time commitment: 8-12 hours.

Treasurer: Pays SCIF-related bills. Collects and records contributions from groups continued on page 2

Officer Reports:

Chair: (Steve B.) Welcome everyone. Elections for officer positions will be in January. Job descriptions will be in next newsletter. Next General Meeting will be held December 17 instead of the 24 of December as voted on at last month's General Meeting.

Vice Chair: (Trevor H.) Thanks and welcome to all new reps. If you're new and did not go to orientation please see Carolyn after meeting to sign in and see me for your orientation packet.

Secretary: (Patty G.) October 22, 2012 General Meeting minutes put forth and approved.

Treasurer: (Jimmie B.) Group contributions for October were \$6,146 which was \$2,876 more than October 2011. Individual contributions were \$100. After group-supported expenses, we had a net gain of \$2,882. Bookstore income was \$7,232 and after expenses had a net gain of \$347. Activities income was \$2,994 and after expenses had a net gain of \$979. Unity Day additional income was \$41. Overall Central Office had a net gain of \$4,249.

Registrar: (Carolyn A.) Last month there were 230 groups offering 373 meetings per week in Sonoma County and at the October General Meeting there were 60 representatives for a 26% representation.

Bookstore report: (Annie T.) Linda wanted everyone to know the bookstore has prepared for holiday shopping with new jewelry and gift items. Please come and check out the bookstore.

ICSC: (Annie T.): Been a busy year for your ICSC. SCIF cash flow was very tight - ended 2011 with a net loss of about \$2,000 and were slightly into the Prudent Reserve. Our previous bookstore Assistant Manager passed away and the ICSC was charged with finding a replacement and did so with Gretchen H. Operating reserve steadily growing since late spring due to both increased group contributions and income from the bookstore. SCIF distributes any available excess funds (operating reserve) at the end of each year. Between our Treasurer, Bookkeeper and Accountant, a new Prudent Reserve is calculated (that is six months of operating expenses - currently \$38,310). They take the past 24 months operating expenses and divide by four. Once the Prudent Reserve has been calculated and adjusted with this formula, any excess funds are distributed to the three tiers of General Service. A few months ago, we began assessing the Bookstore's needs, especially as far as equipment goes. We have purchased a new shredder and Linda is researching new desk phones and a locking cabinet for the growing personnel records. We are also in the process of purchasing a laptop dedicated to our accounting needs.

Committee Reports:

Activities: (Tina C.) December 31 speaker meeting with Bonnie G. New Year's Dance afterwards. Volunteer sign up sheet being passed around. Time is wrong in newsletter – meeting begins at 8pm.

Alkathons: (Kathy M.) Thanksgiving was great. Thanks to all the volunteers and groups that sponsored meetings. If you're coming to the next Alkathon bring food to share. Groups may want to pass around food sign up sheet if you're sponsoring a meeting. We will not be cooking

food at Christmas and New Year's, so please bring already cooked items. Have 2 a.m. and 4 a.m. slots at Christmas still available.

Communications/Newsletter: (Barry D.) Thanks to Dave for printing newsletter and volunteers who proof it each month. Early deadline for January issue – December 7. Will need updated officers from General Service. Michael Q. said listing is on its way.

Unity Day: (Larry O.) Thanks again to all volunteers, presenters, and attendees. Was a successful event and next year, H&I will be in charge.

Outreach: (Ben G.) Attended six meetings this month. One will be sending a rep. Some small meetings don't currently have a volunteer for representation. Can always use help, please contact Ben.

Seminars: (Chris M.) Not present.

Teleservice: (Joe B.) Three shifts rotated out and have been filled. Want people to sign up for future openings. All shifts are filled.

SONOMA COUNTY ICSC

Facts About the Intergroup Central Service Committee

The Intergroup Central Service Committee (ICSC) is a management and oversight committee specifically charged with responsibility to set the policy, regulate the affairs, and oversee the operation of the SCIF Central Office/Bookstore. It also advises the Steering Committee on matters affecting SCIF's status as a non-profit corporation, making sure that state and federal government regulations are followed and regulatory filings are completed as required. As such, it fulfills many of the functions cited as responsibilities of "the Board of Directors" in the California Corporations Code.

The ICSC is a rotating body of five members – two officers and three at-large members elected by the group representatives. The composition of the ICSC committee changes several times a year, providing both continuity and fresh eyes.

• At the Intergroup General Meeting of Nov. 26, 2012, ICSC Chair Annie T. gave a detailed report, a synopsis of which follows:

The current ICSC includes – the Intergroup Chair (Steve B.), and Treasurer (Jimmie B.), and three at-large members (currently Jim W., John F. and myself).

This has been a busy year for your ICSC. Since I came on last October 2011, we have had quite a bit of rotation. When I rotated in, the cash flow was very tight - we actually ended 2011 with a net loss of about \$2,000, and we were slightly into the Prudent Reserve. At the same time, our bookstore Assistant Manager passed away and the ICSC was faced with replacing him. For much of the time I have served on this committee, the ICSC was focused primarily on hiring a new Assistant Manager, and with all the committee rotation, it took a long time to accomplish.

A few months ago we began discussing, with our Bookstore Manager Linda, the Bookstore's needs, especially as far as equipment goes. Our operating reserve has been steadily growing since late spring due to both increased group contributions, and income from the bookstore. Our Intergroup Fellowship distributes any available excess funds (operating reserve) at the end of each year.

It was clear there was going to be excess funds at the end of this year, which if not used by our Intergroup, would be distributed to the three General Service entities. So we have begun the process of updating and adding new equipment at the bookstore – new desk phones, shredder and a locking cabinet for the growing personnel records.

A decision was made by the Intergroup steering that it would be prudent to make such a purchase. It is important to keep our Bookstore well-run, and give our paid workers and volunteers the tools they need to do an efficient job.

With the help of our Teleservice Chair Joe B. (a computer professional) we researched Dell laptops and purchased one for just under \$500. Joe was also hired to perform a complete diagnostic and maintenance on both Linda's existing office computer, and the sales desk computer used by the volunteers.

Your ICSC wishes to keep you all in the loop, as the bookstore belongs to all of us.

The other A.A. that did the first part of the night and the introduction was very experienced in speaking with PI/CPC. It was a fabulous, fabulous experience.

What Access Sonoma County Is and Isn't

We are not the "AA Police" enforcing the width of aisles for wheelchairs or making sure all bathrooms meet certain requirements. We do not tell you what to do with particular issues. We may have resources available for you to help you deal with accessibility issues.

The mission statement of Access Sonoma County (ASC) is "to explore, develop and offer resources to make the message of Alcoholics Anonymous available to everyone who reaches out for it. ASC's goal is to raise awareness of barriers and provide information and tools to remove or minimize those barriers. Example of barriers are impaired hearing, vision, mobility, wheelchair access, language difficulties, childcare, reading challenges."

If you need signs to put in the front row for hearing impaired members – we have them. If you need a list of childcare meetings or meetings that welcome children – we have it. If a member needs a copy of the Big Book in Braille – we have it. If you need a Signing Interpreter for a deaf member – we can help. If you need someone who speaks Mandarin – we have it. And if we don't have what you need to make your meeting accessible to all, let us know - we will get it.

The above is who we are. But there is one thing we don't have and that is YOU. If you are interesting in doing a little more to make the "I am Responsible" statement more than just 26 words, come join us. We meet the second Thursday of each month; the next meeting is Jan. 10, 2013 at 6:30 p.m. at the SCIF Bookstore. Meetings last no more than one hour (I promise!). See you there.


