SCIF Officers are up for election January 27

Chair, Vice-Chair, Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Registrar to be elected

Elections of SCIF Officers will be held on Monday, Jan. 27, 2014 during the Intergroup Business Meeting, 8 p.m. at St. Luke Lutheran Church. The positions to be filled include Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Registrar.

SCIF Officer Job Descriptions: Term length for all jobs is one year. Two consecutive terms are allowed. All officers are required to attend the SCIF steering committee meeting the second Monday of the month and SCIF general business meeting the fourth Monday of the month.

Chairperson: Presides over monthly Intergroup and Steering Committee meetings. Maintains direct communication regularly with other Intergroup officers and committee chairpersons. Serves on ICSC. Must have general knowledge of A.A. Service Manual, Robert's Rules of Order and SCIF business procedures (for conducting Intergroup Business Meeting). Serves on the ICSC committee. Length of sobriety = 4 years. Average monthly time commitment: 8-12 hours.

Vice-Chairperson: Supports Chairperson in his or her duties; and fills in for Chairperson should he or she be absent or unable to perform that office. The Vice Chair should be informed in these matters: 1) Intergroup history and responsibilities; 2) current and pending business; 3) Chair's Rules – that is, parliamentary procedure as informed by A.A.'s Twelve Traditions. In addition, the Vice Chair runs the new rep orientation before the regular

business meeting, gives the summation at the end of the meeting, and may be asked to liaise with other committees or to fill in for absent officers/committee chairs. Length of sobriety = 4 years. Average monthly time commitment: 8-12 hours.

Treasurer: Pays SCIF-related bills. Collects and records contributions from groups and works with bookkeeper in preparing monthly financial statements. Receives all monies collected at Alkathons and SCIF activities. *continued on page 2*

counting background helpful. Serves on the ICSC committee. Length of sobriety = 4 years. Average monthly time commitment: 30+ hours.

Recording Secretary: Takes minutes at SCIF General and Steering Committee meetings. Delivers correct copy of minutes to Newsletter Editor. Length of sobriety = 3 years. Average monthly commitment: 6-8 hours.

Registrar: Maintains a list of groups and meetings available within the county. Keeps track on a monthly basis of which groups have representatives and how often reps attend meetings. Works with Outreach Committee to contact groups that are not active in SCIF meetings. Length of sobriety = 3 years. Average monthly commitment: 4-6 hours.

Sonoma County Intergroup Fellowship General Meeting — November 25, 2013, The meeting opened at 8 p.m. with the Serenity Prayer.

OFFICER REPORTS:

Chair: (Patty G.) Everything is going well. Importance of the Alkathon for alcoholics at the holidays. January is the election of officers. Officer positions are one year commitment. Sobriety requirements: Chair, 5 years; Vice Chair, 5 years; Secretary, 3 years; Treasurer 3 years; Registrar, 3 years. February will be the committee chair elections. Please take to your meetings that positions will be opening up.

Vice Chair: (Tina C.) Those new Reps that didn't attend orientation should arrive by 7:30pm next month to attend the orientation, include phone number and email contact.

Secretary: (Jennifer R.) The General Meeting minutes of October 2013 were put forth and approved.

Treasurer: (Jimmie B.) Financial Summary Report: Group contributions for October were \$4,099 which was \$2,047 less than October of 2012. After expenses, we had a gain of \$347. Bookstore income was \$6,995 and after expenses had a gain of \$34. Activities income was \$1,815 and after expenses had a gain of \$560. Overall had a net gain of \$941.

Registrar: (Carolyn A.) Last month there were 230 groups offering 363 meetings per week in Sonoma County. At Septembers' General Meeting there were 86 reps for 37% representation.

ICSC: (Suzanne A.) Jay S. is now a newly elected member of the ICSC committee. Committee is currently in the process of receiving bids for new carpeting for the Bookstore. Also, in the process of working on the Budget for 2014.

Activities: (Lorie S.) Upcoming event is New Year's Eve meeting and dance. There will be a sobriety count down and pulled pork will be served. Set-up chair needed and well as other volunteers. Planning meeting scheduled for December 4 and December 12 at the bookstore.

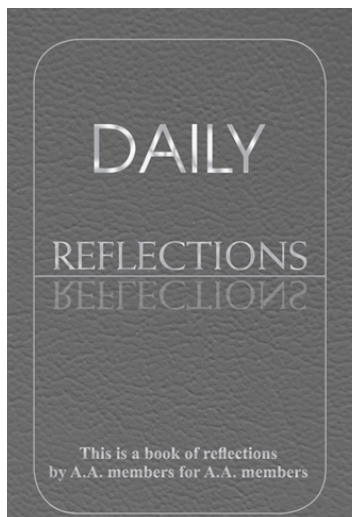
NEWS FROM THE BOOKSTORE

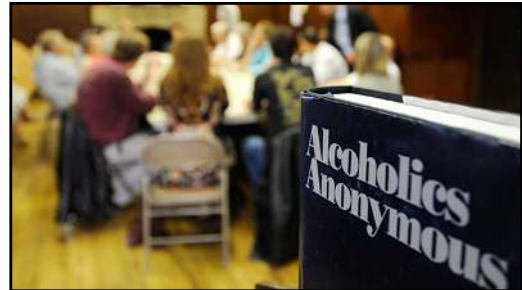

BRIDGING THE GAP

The Goal of Bridging the Gap

Bridging the Gap is a General Service sub-committee that supports that very important first step for alcoholics who have just been released from a hospital, treatment center or correctional facility. By providing a temporary contact, Bridging the Gap helps newcomers make the transition to Alcoholics Anonymous in his or her home community. Members of Alcoholics Anonymous, usually acting in pairs, meet the patients or inmates after release and accompany them to their first A.A. meeting. The goal of the BTG Committee of the California Northern Coastal Area (CNCA) is to make this vital 12-step work possible. If you are interested in learning more about BTG, the regular business meeting takes place on the third Tuesday of the month at the Bookstore in Santa Rosa. New member orientation is at 6:00pm, followed by the business meeting from 6:30-7:30 p.m.

GENERAL SERVICE

Done with Group Inventory? Now What?

If your group is fortunate enough to have a General Service Representative (GSR), he or she, with your help, has most likely completed the process of an inventory for your group. Great job to all! Your participation in how your group reaches its primary purpose is a huge part of what keeps A.A. going for the next suffering alcoholic!

When the notes come back with the results from your group inventory, it's sometimes hard to know what to do with them. Your GSR will probably make the notes available and encourage your meeting members to have a look at them to get an idea of what direction members want to take with the meeting. Generally, announcements are made frequently that the results of the inventory will be discussed over the next several months at steering committee meetings. With the guidance of your GSR, the inventory notes can be addressed and the steering committee can decide how to proceed with changes, if any. Remember to follow your group's guidelines regarding implementing ideas and solutions that are of concern to your group as a result of your inventory.
