However, those in attendance responded enthusiastically because most of us understood, at least some English or spoke it fluently. Everyone understood that it's the desire to feel "a part of" that compels us to share and that speaks to the hearts of all alcoholics. And, after all "Recovery is the Language of the Heart" so a few misunderstood words here and there don't matter! After the sharing, we celebrated with food, music and a cake. # HOSPITALS & INSTITUTIONS

"The last 50 years witnessed the vision of our founders being brought to reality only because drunks like yourselves were able to take a part of that vision and share and extend it. The next 50 years' growth, impact, and success will also depend on vision—the vision of continuity, acceptance, and sharing.

"What we have established in our first 50 years of caring and sharing in correctional facilities is a sound foundation for what could be a golden era during the next 50 years toward the goal of stemming the rate of growth of alcoholics in our prison population. It is important for us to remember during the discussions of this type that we are not "crime stoppers," probation officers, sociologists, therapists, or professors of ethics. We are sober alcoholics doing what we have to do every day to stay sober—not drinking, going to meetings, and sharing the message of sobriety with others who need the helping hand of AA.

"Part of the future of this Fellowship (too much of our future) is right now locked up in jails, prisons, and juvenile detention centers. If that thought bothers you even a little bit, let's change it. We should change it if we love the Fellowship. We can change it if we love the still-suffering alcoholic. We must change it if we love ourselves in sobriety."

front of the June newsletter. Seymour W. will be the speaker. Volunteers are needed. He indicated he has many ideas and events in the works for the future.








# PUBLIC INFORMATION

Every so often, the issue of "anonymity breaks" in obituaries is a lively topic at the Public Information Committee's business meeting. As with everything in AA, we

committee members have varying opinions about the issue. Some thought we should write letters to funeral home directors, explaining the concept of anonymity at the level of press. Some thought it was none of our business, and others were somewhere in the middle. We



"Your recent e-mail came to me, as I currently serve on the Public Information desk here at the General Service Office. My name is Gayle R, and I am an alcoholic. I'm glad to have this opportunity to be in touch.

Thanks for sharing your committee members' concerns regarding AA membership being revealed after death. A.A. members have varying views on personal anonymity at the public level posthumously, as your own committee demonstrates. The General Service Conference recognized that this is a matter which each individual or family decides. In 1988, the Conference recommended that the 1971


> General Service Conference Action be reaffirmed: 'AA members generally think it unwise to break the anonymity of a member even after his death, but in each situation the final decision must rest with the family.'

As members, we can individually let our loved ones

know our wishes, so that they are not faced with this sometimes awkward decision. Hopefully, the decision in each case is made considering AA's Twelve Traditions, and is done in the spirit of placing principles before personalities.
