#### Officer Reports:

**Chair:** (Patty G.) Welcomed everyone. Reported that things are going great. Patty advised if you need information, please contact her or any officer listed on the back of the newsletter. We are here to help.

Vice-Chair: (Tina C.) Not present.

**Secretary:** (Mark V. C.) April 22, 2013 General Meeting Minutes put forth and approved.

**Treasurer:** (Jimmie B.) Group contributions for April were \$4,988 which was \$724 less than April 2012. After expenses, we had a net gain of \$1,002. Bookstore income was \$6,874 and after expenses we had a net loss of \$237. Overall, we had a net gain of \$765 for the month.

**Registrar:** (Carolyn A.) Last month there were 231 groups offering 375 meetings per week in Sonoma County. At April's general meeting there were 74 representatives equaling 32% representation. She asked reps. to be sure to sign in on the correct day of the week (clearly marked) and if the rep. is an alternate or just picking up the items for another representative to sign up using their name, meeting name and meeting time/city.

#### **Committee Reports:**

**Bookstore Report:** (Linda M.) Reported that there are no vacant shifts and all volunteer shifts are filled. Linda pointed out the article about the new Grapevine book, "One on One." It is on sale for 20% off at \$10 per copy while supplies last. If all goes well, perhaps a monthly sale focusing on one book would be a possibility.

**ICSC:** (Jim W.) Jim reported that they are working on the contract for the bookkeeper. The bookstore lease has been renewed for two more years at an increase of \$20 per month.

Activities: (Lorie J.) Not present.

**Alkathons:** (Richard H.) Richard advised that there will be monthly meetings of the Alkathons Committee beginning on June 17th. If you have any suggestions or would like to volunteer, you are welcome to attend.

Communications/Newsletter: (Barry D.) Reported that June

newsletters are available. Barry thanked Donna L. for the great graphics. He advised that the newsletter is available online and encouraged the representatives to pass that information along.

**Seminars:** (Trevor H.) May 29 is the seminar on the Origin of the Twelve Steps. He also reminded that Steps Two & Three: Connecting with a Higher Power is on July 24. Both seminars are at the bookstore.

If you go to aagrapevine.org you can sign up for this free email quote every day. No spam, no contacts, just the free quote.

There is a new compilation Grapevine book on sponsorship, "One On One." These Grapevine books are based on topics and are a really cool way of getting a meeting when you need one in the middle of the night, when you travel, when you are about to go into a business meeting and when you want to scream.

They are working for me and improving my sobriety by reminding me I'm not alone, there are others who have made it too!

#### Meds, Docs and A.A. — Again

I am repeating what I wrote a couple of months ago because Access Sonoma County has decided we would like to do a workshop on the "Mental Health" issues. Please re-read this and help us set up this workshop for this fall. Thanks and we need your help!

A couple of weeks ago I attended a speaker meeting where the speaker mentioned that she had some other "outside issues" that she had to seek medical help for, which included medication. Well that really made the discussion period lively. It was a large meeting so we ran the complete range of responses. Everything from "if you are taking medication you are not sober," or quoting from the Big Book, "There are those, too who suffer from grave emotional and mental disorders, but many of them do recover if they have the capacity to be honest," Alcoholics Anonymous page 58, or "A.A. is not a medical organization, does not give out medicines or psychiatric advice," A Brief Guide to Alcoholics Anonymous (Pamphlet) page 10.

If or when this subject comes up at your meeting you might want to have a copy of a sheet Access Sonoma County put together with quotes from the Big Book, Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, Loving Sober and various pamphlets regarding this issue. There is also an excellent pamphlet "The AA Member – Medication and Other Drugs". Please help us put this workshop together. We are a small committee we need your help.


#### "Language of the Heart" Turns 25

The SCIF Bookstore is celebrating the 25th anniversary of "Language of the Heart" by offering the soft-cover collection of Bill W.'s Grapevine articles for just \$13 per copy, which is \$1.50 off the regular price.

Bill W. was the Grapevine's most prolific contributor, writing more than 150 articles, from his first in June 1944 to his last in December

1970. Here in one volume are all of Bill's Grapevine articles, including his first thoughts about the Traditions, his battles with chronic depression and spiritual pride, memories of an all-night drinking spree with Ebby, and a vivid description of how he came to organize the Steps (there were six in the first draft).

Between 1944 and 1971, Bill wrote 150

articles for AA Grapevine, helping to unite the Fellowship's new groups and hammering out the principles of A.A. These articles give us a living history of Alcoholics Anonymous and the story of Bill W.'s emotional and spiritual growth.

#### PI/CPC NEWS

#### Being in Service Keeps Us Sober

PI/CPC stands for Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community. I had heard of PI/CPC since I moved to the area, and saw an information table at Unity Day, but really had no idea what it was about. That big title is a little intimidating. Honestly, cooperating with the professional community and being a point of public information seemed intimidating as well.

Thinking that service helps to keep me sober, and making coffee is not my forte, I decided to check it out. Orientation was informative and not too scary. There was a lot of information, and ways to present that information, but luckily (as with most things in A.A.) there is a pamphlet for

that. I still take those pamphlets with me when I speak, in order to remind myself how to address groups that may be unfamiliar with A.A.

A PI/CPC speaker adopted me. He took me along with him to observe while he and his partner taught a DUI class (we always speak in pairs). A couple of weeks later, I was observed as I taught my first DUI class. I make sure to lead off my presentation with the fact that I am a member of Alcoholics Anonymous,

not a spokesperson or representative. Then I talk about what A.A. is, what it is to me, and what A.A. isn't. When sharing some of my story, I focus on the progression of my disease, and the solution.

I've been asked if I think PI/CPC really makes a difference. During a recent speaking engagement at a local high school, a student talked to me afterwards. He told me about his father, and asked for a meeting schedule. We chatted for a few more minutes before he asked his real question. He wanted to know if it was OK for him to attend a meeting if he could get his father to go with him. I explained about open meetings and assured him it would be alright. If I speak a thousand more times, and he is the only person that hears the message, I think it made a difference.

If you are interested in being of service with PI/CPC, you are invited to join us the second Wednesday of the month at City Hall's meeting room in the underground parking garage on First Street. Speaker training is at 7 p.m., followed by the business meeting at 7:30 p.m.

#### **BRIDGING THE GAP**

#### Helping the Newcomer in Transition

My name is Tom F. and I'm an alcoholic and your newly elected Chair of Bridging the Gap. I have been a part of this committee for about four years as a phone coordinator and presenter. I never anticipated becoming Chair of a committee, but here I am. My sponsor taught me to suit up and show up whenever possible. Here in Sonoma County we do approximately 10-12 presentations a month at 8-10 facilities (some are multiple times a month, some every other month). At the presentations, we offer the clients the opportunity to meet with a volunteer when they get out of their facility, and that volunteer will introduce that client to Alcoholics Anonymous meetings on the outside. Those presentations generate approximately 40 requests a month, and we also get requests from out of the area, for clients that are returning to Sonoma County.

We are in the process of updating both the women's and men's phone list and are finding that we need more volunteers. Who are the volunteers? You are! We match clients with volunteers based on sex, age and address. If you are willing to be on the volunteer list, please fill out a form. They are available from your General Service rep., or you can call or email me for a form (my info is on the back of the newsletter).

Doing service work is greatly rewarding in A.A., and this Twelfth Step work is pretty simple and does not require a long commitment. Please join us — our monthly business meeting is at the bookstore on the third Tuesday of every month, 6 p.m. for orientation and 6:30 p.m. for the regular meeting. See you there!
