Overall we had a net gain of \$1,461, and year to date we are \$3,493 more than April of last year.

**ADJOURNMENT:** The meeting adjourned at 8:40 p.m. with the Responsibility Statement.

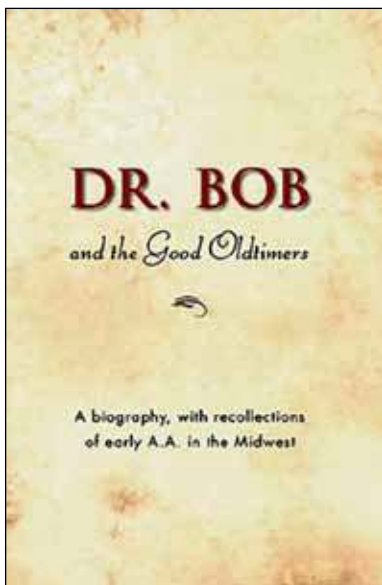

When I came into the rooms, the nerve endings in my feet were actually dying from toxic exposure to alcohol, a process that feels a lot like having your feet constantly bathed in fire. My doctor had prescribed a non-narcotic pain-killer that was helping, but as I set out to get sober, I had a nagging fear: would I have to choose between my sobriety and relief from this pain? In the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous, though, I met a few people who took the time to talk to me about their own experiences with chronic pain, how they managed it and how they stayed sober. These days, the pain and numbness have subsided to levels I can accept without medication, but I can't adequately express the gratitude I feel to these people who took the time in those early days to make sure I knew that there was a solution.

So I was very grateful to participate in the Pain Management in Sobriety Workshop on May 30, where approximately 150 of my fellow alcoholics gathered to offer each other the same kind of support that was so important to me in my first few 24 hours. At the workshop, we reviewed official A.A. literature that provides guidance around some of these topics. We heard a professional perspective on pain, too, including the difference between acute and chronic pain, how pain can have many taproots both physical and emotional, and strategies for living with and relieving pain. Two panels of alcoholics living with chronic pain shared with us, the first focusing on their experience strength and hope, the second focusing on their solutions in the mind body and spirit. The third panel brought us a sponsor, sponsee, and the sponsee's doctor, who together talked to us about their experiences working together to support the sponsee's health and sobriety. Finally, a microphone was passed around in the audience and we heard additional perspectives from throughout our fellowship.

It was an amazing day, and I am pleased to tell you that our IT Committee recorded the audio for us. In June, Access Sonoma County explored ways to distribute this recording, and by the time you read this in July, we'll have it figured out. **What Is ICSC?**

The Intergroup Central Service Committee (ICSC) is a management and oversight committee specifically charged with responsibility to set the policy, regulate the affairs, and oversee the operation of the SCIF Central Office/Bookstore. It also advises the Steering Committee on matters affecting SCIF's status as a non-profit corporation, making sure that state and federal government regulations are followed and regulatory filings are completed as required.

The ICSC is a rotating body of five members – two officers and three at-large members elected by the group representatives. The composition of the ICSC committee changes several times a year, providing both continuity and fresh eyes.

ICSC members attend the SCIF Steering Committee, General meetings of SCIF, as well as the ICSC meetings.

The agenda of the ICSC meeting typically includes a review of financial results for the month, the status of volunteer staffing at the Bookstore, quarterly reviews of inventory levels, information about proposed new retail offerings, and any issues relating to physical plant maintenance, security, and capital outlays.

If you're interested in making yourself available for ICSC, a minimum of five years of sobriety is strongly suggested, as is a business or professional background, and substantial A.A. service experience. To find out more, contact Mike C., at 696-1840.
