*long time to get things done in AA. But*


*remember, we measure our lives by the simple day. Today*

## THERE'S NO "OSCAR" FOR AA'S

I love the annual Academy Awards, even with all the glitz and silliness. I so admire actors, directors, cinematographers, and all the movie folks. After all, I've been addicted to drama all my life. I'm Pat, and I'm an alcoholic/addict. Lately I've been learning some uncomfortable but really useful stuff about myself. When I saw the request for material in the February newsletter, I thought it might clarify my thinking to write down some of the process. I hope some of it is helpful to

another human or two.

I attended my first meeting in 1985, I believe, but it has taken all these years for me to truly internalize the Steps. I'm saddened to remember the relapses, the pledges, and the teeth grinding and wailing. I tried to white-knuckle for seven years and it was dismal. I could keep away from alcohol, but I still went out with her friends. Finally, in 2001, I was homeless, broke, beaten down by life, and by my own foolish choices. I came to Santa Rosa and hooked up with


"The Fellowship collectively has achieved some degree of maturity in sobriety. The Fellowship has experienced an amazing continuity of purpose, and there has survived a sense of responsibility for the still-suffering alcoholics (in most instances, that is, if they come to meetings on time, we are not too inconvenienced by their condition, location and attitude.)

"There are still some few signs of our residual adolescence as we wrestle with the problems of: dual addiction, age factor (too young), treatment center referrals, and court referrals. Also, like adolescents, we profess love and tolerance to our ancestral history and heritage, but we have not quite made the same degree of commitment to the still-suffering alcoholic we haven't even met yet."

# Serenity Fellowship

The Serenity Fellowship Hall (located at 4527-C Montgomery Drive in Santa Rosa) is looking for sober alcoholics to attend any one or more of its 37 meetings a week. We have a Step-Study 5 days a week at



3:30PM, the rest range from open discussion, speaker discussion to various book studies. We have a women's meeting on Thursdays at 6:45PM., Big-Book studies, Traditions study, Came to Believe, As Bill Sees It, Living Sober, Daily Reflections. And don't forget Night Owls and Midnight Madness at 10:30PM & 12:30AM on Friday and Saturday Nights. All in one pleasant meeting hall!! Please bring your experience, strength and hope to share.

When people think of the Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community Committee, PI/CPC, often they think of speaking to various groups about AA, like drinking driver classes. While it's true that members of the PI/CPC committee do speak in public, another one of the tasks of the committee is to distribute literature to various places in the community. One of the places where the committee distributes literature is the Sonoma County Jail. Below is an excerpt from a recent letter the committee received from Friends Outside, the group that distributes the literature within the jail.



*"AA literature is some of the most read literature in the Visitor's Lobby of the Sonoma County Jail! Thanks to you, literally hundreds of people have been referred to AA during the last three years. There are about 1,300 inmates in Sonoma County jails on any given day. It is estimated that at least 80% of the inmates have substance and/or alcohol abuse problems; that means about 1,000 on any given day. And their friends and relatives, many of whom also have a substance abuse or alcohol problem, are coming to visit them regularly. We*

*distribute huge quantities of AA literature to inmates and visitors. AA pamphlets help us educate the inmate's family and friends. They find hope.*

*"We maintain AA literature racks in three locations with the Sonoma County jail visitor's lobby, unrelated to the H&I programs provided for inmates inside the jail. The racks of AA literature are by the Cashier where every inmate is released, in the visitor's waiting area where they sit for at least 30 minutes before visiting and up to five hours waiting for an inmate to be released, and we maintain racks of literature in the Friends Outside Drop-in-Center just off the lobby. We use AA literature every day to help people*

*understand alcoholism and where they can turn for help. Providing AA literature to the visitors and inmates at Sonoma County jail is a great community service. We hope you continue providing this valuable information."*

If you are interested in working with the PI/CPC committee, it meets on the second Wednesday of each month in the Santa Rosa City Employees' Lounge underneath City Hall. Speaker training starts at 7:00PM. and the business meeting follows at 7:30PM.

a safe place to live. The agency running that sober living environment required documentation of at least three meetings a week. That got me into the rooms regularly. In the rooms, the old-timers were saying the same old things: *Bring the body, the mind will follow. Easy does it. First things first. Read the book. Get a sponsor. Define a Higher Power and trust. Pray every day for the willingness to change.*

I also heard *Fake it until you Make it.* This one proved my undoing. (I mention this to demonstrate my sick thinking, the slogan itself is A-OK.) I began to "act as if" I was in recovery. I began to take suggestions. I really read the books and I really wrote notebooks full of answers to questions in Step Study Guides. I really went to meetings. I really took commitments. My body responded and got healthier. I met wonderful folks. Sounds good, huh? I thought so too. I kept waiting for an Oscar, because I was doing the best acting of my career so far. All the program activities were genuine, but I



was accepting commitments for two or three months and then dropping them. I was making poor decisions, which proved self-sabotaging. I created financial drama by continuing old spending habits. I bought a promotional travel package but told everyone I'd won a cruise. I missed doctor's appointments, a big red flag for a first-year cancer survivor. Most telling of all, I reverted to treating myself as an abandoned vehicle, and encouraged others to treat me as a free ride. And I hid all that from all of you as best I

could. And I didn't ask for help with any of it. What was missing, of course was any reliance on a *Power greater than myself.* As our Big Book says on page 60, *"The first requirement is that we be convinced that any life run on self-will can hardly be a success."* How had I missed this giant idea? I was talking program, but walking self-will run riot. When I "act as if", I never look to God to be Director of the play. I think it's up to me to interpret the material.. and mercy, what dreadful drama ensues! I frantically improvise, with only a dim understanding of character and plot. I'm terrified you all are going to notice I don't know my part. May I have the envelope, please?

No Oscar. Just another relapse last fall, and some rigorous amends since. This article is part of the amends. I can't act a part - Look! Pat is in recovery - and hope for a spiritual transformation. I must commit to recovery with head, heart, hands, and feet. Then the Sunlight of the Spirit may grace my path, one day at a time. For the sake of my recovery, please hold your applause.
