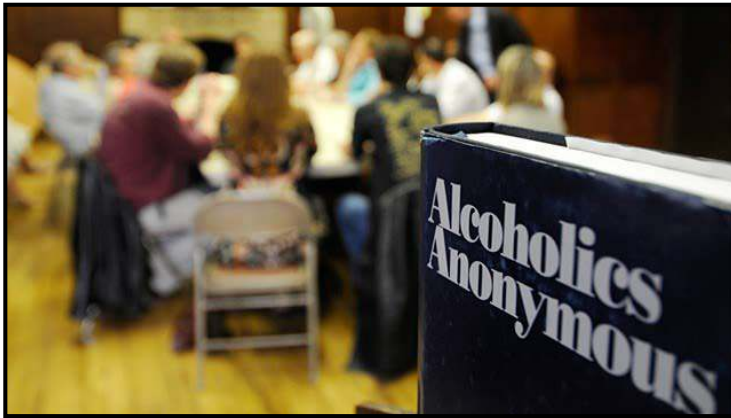

OFFICER REPORTS:

Chair: (Patty G.) Election of officer positions will begin tonight. Joann L. will explain the Third Legacy procedure for elections and will run the elections for the evening.

Vice Chair: (Tina C.) Those new reps that did not attend the orientation tonight should arrive by 7:30 p.m. next month to attend the orientation, include phone number and email contact.

Secretary: (Jennifer R.) The General Meeting minutes for December were put forth and approved.

Treasurer: (Jimmie B.) Financial Summary Report: Group contributions for December were \$3,967 which was \$1,077 more than December of 2013. After expenses, we had a gain of \$269. Bookstore income was \$6,630 and after expenses we had a gain of \$152. Alkathon income was \$2,075 and after expenses had a loss of \$954. Unity Day was \$400. Overall, we had a net gain of \$488.

Registrar: (Carolyn A.): Carolyn reported that in December there were 234 groups of 187 reps named, offering 367 meetings per week in Sonoma County. At the December General Meeting there were 47 representatives for a representation of 20%. Again, reps. are encouraged to sign in on the correct day of week (clearly marked) and if the rep. is an alternate or just picking up the items for another representative please be sure to sign up using their name, meeting name, and meeting time/city.

Outreach: (Ben G.) Went to three unrepresented meetings to encourage groups to have Intergroup reps.

H&I: (Patrick W.) H&I carries the message of A.A. to confined alcoholics. Meets the second Wednesday of the month at the Community of Christ Church at W. Steele and Range in Santa Rosa. Orientation is at 5:45 p.m., meeting at 6:15 p.m. Last month there was one blackout (H&I didn't show) and no brownouts (facility did not allow meeting). Currently there are 19 H&I meetings in Sonoma County.

When a Bridge Made All the Difference

I went through a local “spin-dry” 28-day treatment program in 1996, which was my first exposure to A.A. meetings. The meetings were conveniently held at the facility. I would sit in those meetings, feeling like I wanted to jump out of my skin, wondering how I could possibly stay sober when released.

By the end of the 28 days I was scared. I was going back home to an angry marriage and two little kids, and the way I had dealt with it before was to get loaded. I was scared of being able to stay sober, but also scared of walking into meetings where I didn't know anybody. As they say, fear is the root of our problems.

Fortunately, I was contacted by another female alcoholic, who offered to take me to a meeting when I graduated. I really don't know if I would have done it on my own. She filled the gap between the safe recovery facility and the “scary” outside world. Her Twelfth Step service started me on the path of being willing to take action. Seventeen years later, I'm still sober and attending A.A. meetings.

In Sonoma County, Bridging the Gap (BTG) fills that important role. BTG is a subcommittee of General Service that trains volunteers to take presentations into recovery facilities and jails, spreading the word of support. Newly recovering alcoholics can sign up to be contacted by a BTG volunteer, who will take or meet them at an A.A. meeting in their community when released. What a relief that is for the newbie!

Volunteering with BTG is an easy service commitment, and service keeps A.A.s sober! You can serve as a BTG presenter or be on the volunteer call list to connect with a newcomer of the same gender. Check it out by attending a BTG meeting, held at the A.A. Bookstore on the third Tuesday of the month from 6:30-7:30 p.m. First timers attend orientation at 6:00 pm. Bridging the Gap always needs volunteers, who are at least 6 months sober. Will you be the next one to step up?

Are You Ready for Service?

What does it mean to be in service? The Alcoholics Anonymous Big Book tells me having had a personality change sufficient to recover from alcoholism as a result of working the steps (a.k.a. a spiritual awakening), we carry the message to other alcoholics. So service is working with others.

How and why should I be in service? The Big Book chapter “Working with Others” describes how to approach and be helpful to others. Helping others is the foundation of our recovery. Where should I be in service? It's suggested to practice the principles of the Twelve Steps in “all” of my affairs. It's everywhere and how I interact with friends, spouse, children, on the job, in the supermarket check-out line, and driving in traffic, etc.

So many in our society need A.A., and it's those who want it who take action, but what of the alcoholic who knows nothing of A.A.? What about the person who wonders if they have a problem with alcohol, but they don't know where to turn? Are you thinking about a service commitment? Come to PI/CPC. It's a subcommittee of General Service and there's more to do than there are people to do it. It serves two purposes.

The Public Information (PI) part provides accurate A.A. information to the public when requested. We may carry the message by getting in touch with the media, schools, senior centers, libraries, hospitals, or any other appropriate venue providing speakers and literature when asked. We emphasize our Traditions of anonymity, singleness of purpose and non-affiliation. The Cooperation with the Professional Community (CPC) piece provides information about A.A. to those who have contact with alcoholics through their profession – health care professionals, educators, clergy, law enforcement, court officials and those working in the field of alcoholism. Information is provided about where we are, what we are, what we can do and what we cannot do.

When? You could get involved distributing literature or speaking at a DUI program for example. Please come: attend the speaker training that starts at 7p.m. and stay for the business meeting at 7:30pm. We meet on the 2nd Wednesday of each month at the SR City Hall employee lounge by the underground parking. PI/CPC can be reached at (707) 538-2310 or picpc@sonomacountyaa.org.

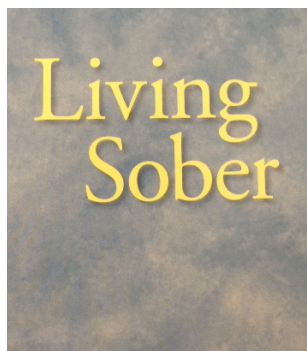

NEWS FROM THE BOOKSTORE

During the month of March your Sonoma County Intergroup Bookstore will be offering "Living Sober" at the reduced price of only \$4.49 per copy. "Living Sober" is given away to "newcomers" at many meetings, but this is a book that people with many years of sobriety turn to when they are feeling a little low and need to remember some of the simple tools that are explained in "Living Sober." Come by the Bookstore in March and pick up one copy of "Living Sober" for a newcomer and one for your book shelf at home.



The Sonoma County Intergroup Bookstore currently has a volunteer shift open on alternate Tuesday afternoons. This bookstore shift normally begins at 2 p.m. and ends at 6 p.m. During the winter months when daylight savings time is not in effect the hours are from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.. All Bookstore volunteers must have at least one year of continuous sobriety, have completed the Twelve steps, have knowledge of the Twelve Traditions, and some background in A.A. service work. Retail sales, customer service experience and computer literacy are also very helpful when you are a Bookstore volunteer. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer please come to the Bookstore and fill out an application.

GENERAL SERVICE**Workshop on Mental Health and Alcoholism**

Thinking back to the Mental Health and Alcoholism workshop, held by Access Sonoma County in November, I want to share my experience with the workshop. I was amazed at the turnout, it was standing room only. This inspired me to see so many people interested in a topic that I believe is not talked about enough in Alcoholics Anonymous. I personally struggle with some mental and neurological disorders, and this topic touches me on a very personal level. The A.A. program has helped me to be able to deal with these other disorders, by staying sober. I have a psychiatrist for treating my other disorders, but staying sober has always had to come first for me. Even the Big Book talks about the usefulness of doctors, so I need both the A.A. program and outside help to be successful.

I found the experience that one woman shared about sponsoring individuals with a mental health diagnosis to be of extreme value. I have special needs to be taken into consideration by my sponsor, and I also need to be sensitive to the special needs of my sponsees. Not everyone learns the same way, and if I am responsible to carry the message of A.A. to the suffering alcoholic, then I need to be willing to adapt to the person and the situation. What gets in the way of carrying the message to another suffering alcoholic for me is when I let social stigmas or misunderstandings influence my judgments. I hope that there are many more seminars like this one. Remember love and tolerance of others is our code.

Big Book Classes in Sonoma

The Sonoma Valley Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous (SVFAA) is presenting a 10-week class "The Big Book Comes Alive!" The meeting class is being held every Monday night at 7 p.m.-8 p.m. starting Monday March 3, and running through Monday May 5. The one-hour weekly meeting will cover the Twelve Steps in 10 weeks, and will feature the complete audio CDs from the 1999 workshop given by Joe McQ. and Charlie P. in Sacramento, CA. There is no cost for the meeting which is supported by our Seventh Tradition. We will follow the format for our regular Monday night Big Book Study A.A. meeting, except that instead of reading aloud from the Big Book, we will listen to Joe and Charlie teach the Twelve Steps from the Big Book and we will follow along. Bring your own copy of the Big Book. We will provide everyone with copies of the printed worksheets that were passed out at the original workshop free of charge.

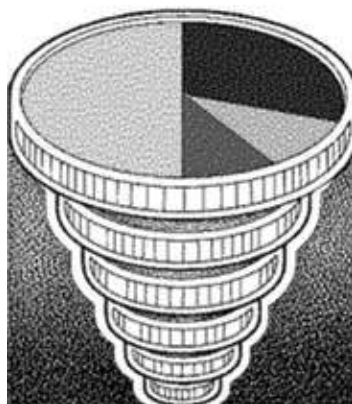
