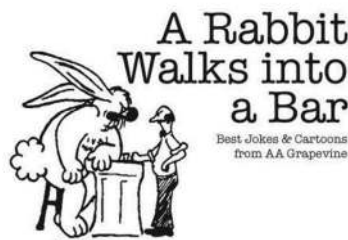

OUR CODE: LOVE AND TOLERANCE OF OTHERS

(Excerpt from the editorial column of the A.A. Grapevine - July 1944)

“Love and Tolerance of others is our code.” -Big Book, Page 84

During nine years in AA, I have observed that those who follow the Alcoholics Anonymous program with the greatest earnestness and zeal not only maintain sobriety but often acquire finer characteristics and attitudes as well.

One of these is tolerance. Tolerance expresses itself in a variety of ways: in kindness and consideration toward the man or woman who is just beginning the march along the spiritual path; in the understanding of those who perhaps have been less fortunate in education advantages; and in sympathy toward those whose religious ideas may seem to be at great variance with our own. I am reminded in this connection of the picture of a hub with its radiating spokes.

We all start at the outer circumference and approach our destination by one of many routes. To say that one spoke is much better than all the other spokes is true only in the sense of its being best suited to you as an individual.

Human nature is such that without some degree of tolerance, each one of us might be inclined to believe that we have found the best or perhaps the shortest spoke. Without some tolerance, we might tend to become a bit smug or superior – which, of course, is not helpful to the person we are trying to help and may be quite painful or obnoxious to others.

No one of us wishes to do anything that might act as a deterrent to the advancement of another – and a patronizing attitude can readily slow up this process.

Tolerance furnishes, as a by-product, a greater freedom from the tendency to cling to preconceived ideas and stubbornly adhered-to opinions. In other words, it often promotes an open-mindedness that is vastly important – is, in fact, a prerequisite to the successful termination of any line of search, whether it be scientific or spiritual.

These, then, are a few of the reasons why an attempt to acquire tolerance should be made by each one of us.

NATIVE AMERICAN CODE OF ETHICS

1. Rise with the sun to pray. Pray alone. Pray often. The Great Spirit will listen, if you only speak.

2. Be tolerant of those who are lost on their path. Ignorance, conceit, anger, jealousy and greed stem from a lost soul. Pray that they will find guidance.

3. Search for yourself, by yourself. Do not allow others to make your path for you. It is your road, and yours alone. Others may walk it with you, but no one can walk it for you.

4. Treat the guests in your home with much consideration. Serve them the best food, give them the best bed and treat them with respect and honour.

5. Do not take what is not yours whether from a person, a community, the wilderness or from a culture. It was not earned nor given. It is not yours.

6. Respect all things that are placed upon this earth, whether it be people or plant.

7. Honour other people's thoughts, wishes and words. Never interrupt another or mock or rudely mimic them. Allow each person the right to personal expression.

8. Never speak of others in a bad way. The negative energy that you put out into the universe will multiply when it returns to you.

9. All persons make mistakes. And all mistakes can be forgiven.

OPEN YOUR HAND FOR 12TH-STEP WORK

The “A.A. Hotline” furnishes a vital service for Alcoholics Anonymous and is staffed by volunteers serving on the Sonoma County Intergroup Fellowship Teleservice Committee. These trusted servants provide a personal point of contact, around the clock, seven days a week, and are often the caller's first connection with Alcoholics Anonymous. We provide information to callers about meeting schedules and changes, answer questions about A.A. We also provide contact information for detox and residential facilities, alcoholism services in other areas, and information to family members and friends of alcoholics, including contact information for Alanon and Alateen. Perhaps most importantly, we refer callers in need of help to 12th-Step Volunteers (“12th-Steppers”) to follow up with personal assistance. Hotline volunteers answering the phones take the caller's contact information and forward it to a 12th-Stepper for follow up. We refer men to men and women to women.

Right now, Teleservice is recruiting 12th-Steppers who will be willing to accept referrals for personal 12th-Step work with suffering alcoholics. Volunteers must have one year of continuous sobriety, familiarity with the Steps and Traditions, and have desire to help other alcoholics one-on-one.

Teleservice is also recruiting volunteers to cover shifts on the 24-hour AA hotline. The hotline answering service forwards calls to the volunteers personal landline or mobile phone line. Shifts are 4 or 5 hours long or overnight. We especially need folks who could cover daytime shifts during the week, e.g. Wednesday or Thursday. Volunteers must have one year of continuous sobriety, familiarity with the Steps and Traditions, and have completed an orientation/training session.

Our next orientation/training meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 14, 2019 at 6:00pm at the AA Central Office 750 Mendocino Ave., Suite 10, Santa Rosa. All hotline volunteers are encouraged to attend and share their experience, strength and hope with new volunteers.

OFFICER REPORTS:

Chair: (Justin C.) Thank you to Barry for stepping up and getting the April Newsletter out. Thanked everyone who stepped up to serve on the committee.

Vice Chair: (Amber H.) There were 3 new reps at orientation. Encouraged all new reps to come to the orientation next month.

Secretary: (Serena B.) Minutes were passed.

Treasurer: (Suzanne L.) Group contributions for February were \$9,061 which was \$5,382 more than February of last year, we received \$10 from bank interest and \$150 in group insurance fees for a total of \$9,220 and after expenses we had a net gain of \$5,617. Bookstore income was \$7,923 and after expenses we had a net gain of \$332. We received \$150 in group insurance fees. Overall, we had a net gain of \$5,949.

Registrar: (Max B.) As of February 28, 2019, there were 237 groups in Sonoma County offering 346 meetings each week. There are 173 meeting representatives on record, for 73% participation. There were 51 representatives attending the February 2019 General Meeting, for 30% participation.

There were 5 new reps attending the February 2019 new rep orientation. There were 8 reps overall.

COMMITTEES:

ICSC: (Barry D.) Our next election will be in April. We are looking for conscientious, active participants.

BOOKSTORE: (Glenn C.) April sale book: Step by Step, regular price \$16.99; sale price \$13.60. Spring/Summer hours are in effect and the bookstore is open from 10am – 6pm Mon – Fri. Glenn answered questions about renewal of insurance for meetings, payments are due on May 10, 2019.

INTERGROUP TREASURER'S REPORT - MARCH 2019

The Central Office income for March 2019 includes \$1,500 from Group Contributions, \$100 from Group Insurance Collections, and \$12 from Bank Interest for a total of \$1,612. Total expenses for March were \$3,900.

The Bookstore income for March 2019 was \$8,628 and \$100 from Group Insurance Collections for a total of \$8,728. The Bookstore expenses were \$11,672.

We had a net loss of \$1,333 in March 2019.

Year-to-date, our income is \$42,834. Our expense is \$33,871, leaving a net gain of \$8,962.
