Meetings in Treatment Centers Help People Get Sober, But Is It Really AA?

I was asked to write an introduction for you to better understand the issue facing us. Some time ago, a member came to the Intergroup Steering committee meeting with an issue that concerned him, He had been asked to chair a meeting at a local recovery facility. When he arrived he was prevented from chairing because he had formerly been a resident of the facility, and had not left according to the rules of the facility. He feels that this restriction is against the some AA traditions, and asks us to consider the implications of these rules.

Tradition Three states that "any two Alcoholics may call themselves a meeting as long, as a group, they have no other

affiliation". That much is clear. So, please consider these points.

- ▲ Is a meeting held under the auspices of a Recovery Facility affiliated with that institution?
- ▲ What constitutes affiliation? How closely do we need to adhere to the Traditions?
- ▲ Should meetings in facilities with special rules be listed in our meeting schedule?
- ▲ Should we have a different listing for affiliated meetings?
- ▲ Is this type of meeting more properly an H&I meeting?

This issue will be coming to a meeting near you, and it will generate some controversy. The point is to keep your



March 22, 2004

Outreach: Linda reported that she is working on determining which groups are represented and asked that Reps please indicate on the sign-in sheet when their commitment expires.

LIAISON REPORTS

General Service: Donna K. reported that G.S. held its agenda topics workshop on 2/21/04 and it was a success with 76 registrants. All G.S. reps should be setting up sharing sessions with their groups in preparation for obtaining group consciences' on agenda topics. Preparations are being made for the Pre-Conference Assembly which will take place April 3-4 in Antioch. The Pacific Region AA Service Assembly was held in Irvine on March 5, 6, & 7th. There were 1550 registrants (141 from California Northern Coastal Area, 25 of which were from Sonoma County). General Service was able to fund 3 GSR's to this event.

PI/CPC: Dave R. reported that deliveries of AA literature were made to numerous jails and hospitals during the past month. Public Service Announcements have been delivered to local radio and television stations for broadcast.

Bridging the Gap: Carolyn reported that BTG did 5 presentations at facilities and received 19 local and 24 out of district requests for BTG services during the past month.

HOSPITALS & INSTITUTIONS


"[The prediction] for those of us in the Fellowship for the next 50 years is a mission, which, if we accept the challenge, can reach the most severely suffering alcoholics in North America.

Within the last three years, the US Department of Justice released a research report indicating as much as 80% of our prisoners should be classified either problem drinkers or alcoholics. There is little evidence or reason to believe that situation will change significantly during the next 50 years:

- *Unless during the next 50 years we are willing to share without reservation or prejudice the joy of sobriety with the youth who are suffering alcoholics. Most crime is committed by males between the ages of 17 and 27.*
- *Unless during the next 50 years we are willing to carry the message of sobriety to our neighbors who are suffering alcoholics in the ghettos and barrios of our major cities. A significantly disproportionate number of our prisoners come from black and Hispanic neighborhoods of our metropolitan areas. These inner city dwellers are among the most victimized by alcoholism."*

Happy Trails



emotional sobriety, and work to create change (or not) in the direction you feel is right. Read and study the traditions, keep your discussion to principles and talk to your service sponsor. Voice your opinion to your Intergroup Rep and/or come to the monthly Intergroup meeting to participate in our discussion.

The articles below were written by two members of our Fellowship. They present differing perspectives on this question for your consideration.

Our Fourth Tradition concerning group autonomy must have pre-eminence if it is to have meaning. It would be pointless to say, "Each group can do just as it likes, provided it obeys all these rules..."

In observing this Tradition, says Bill, there are just two things to look out for. "A group ought not do anything that would greatly injure AA as a whole, nor ought it affiliate itself with anything or anyone else."

What did Bill mean by "affiliation"? "There would be great danger if we were to call some groups 'wet,' others 'dry,' still others 'Republican' or 'Communist,' and yet others 'Catholic,' or 'Protestant.'" He isn't talking here about "implied" affiliation, he means the real thing.

In all other respects, "Every group had the right to be wrong." "We saw that the group, exactly like the individual, must eventually conform to whatever tested principles would guarantee survival. We had discovered that there was perfect safety in the process of trial and error."

I believe that the more we are able to let go of control" of the group over the individual member, and of the organization over the individual group, the more room there is for a Higher Power to operate among us. And the more time and energy we will have to help other alcoholics.

This is particularly true of our Ninth Tradition service. "Who is more unpopular than the old-timer AA, full of wisdom, who moves to another area and tries to tell the group there how to run its business? He and all like him who "view with alarm for the good of AA" meet the most stubborn resistance, and worse still, laughter." (My guess is that here Bill was speaking from personal experience.)

Since coming to our fellowship in 1969, I have seen a lot of change, good and some of it not so good. One thing that has troubled me for some time is the lack of attention to our Twelve Traditions.

We have seen the development of treatment centers and transitional living houses. I believe that AA meetings held in these places should be under the auspices of our Hospitals and Institutions Committee. I feel that meetings established by and in these facilities are in fact "House meetings", run by house rules, even though they follow an AA meeting format. This creates affiliation, whether actual or implied. The traditions are largely ignored. Our Third Tradition (long form) states that any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves a group, provided that, as a group, they have no other affiliation. The line between what is treatment and what is AA is becoming more and more blurred.

I urge everyone in our fellowship to read "Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age". If it has been a while since you read it, please read it again. Bill Wilson wrote, in "AA Comes of Age"; "It was recognized that the Twelve Traditions are going to be just as necessary to the life of our society as the Twelve Steps were to the life of each member. We saw that the A.A. traditions were the key to the unity, the functioning, and even the eventual survival of Alcoholics Anonymous."
