HOMELESS IN SOBRIETY

As I sit-alone-at a transit mall, I am faced with the reality that sobriety is no walk in the park, the current discomfort being a result of me finding myself homeless in sobriety.

I was just reflecting on my recent contrasting experiences with being homeless. For a number of months, before I got clean, I was homeless but still getting loaded. It occurs to me that there was good and bad during that time period. Namely that I didn't have to actually feel the emotions associated with what I was going through – that being good in some twisted way of thinking-. However there were a lot of options not available to me because I was drinking-that being the bad part of it.

Today, I am determined to stay clean, so I GET to experience what it feels like. And what I feel is especially powerful at certain times like now. The one that gets me the most is loneliness. Like sitting here surrounded by people, yet feeling alone.

Today, I choose to walk through these dark times focusing on truths passed on to me from others in the fellowship. One example is that we are never truly alone if we have turned our will and life over to our higher power. We need only take a moment to see where He has assisted us in getting this far in recovery. To take that theme a little farther, we only receive what we can handle.

Here I am reminded of a personal truth: that these seemingly overwhelming emotions don't last as long as I am always afraid they will. Then, once I have successfully walked through them, sober, I get to look back with awe as I see how my higher power given me an opportunity to see the progress I have made and the strength He has granted me.

I must admit that the beginning of my recovery has not gone the way I had imagined it would. I could never have anticipated being homeless with just over 100 days sober.

So I say thank you to my higher power for this period to observe your love of me and the way you care for me. Thank you for this period of time during which I get to focus on relying on you. May I remember what I am now learning about you always.

Chair: Bob P.- Talked about needing a Unity Day Chairperson and what a great service commitment that is. We will have our regular Intergroup meeting on Memorial Day.

Vice Chair: Sean M.-Welcome to new representatives. Any questions please feel free to call him. His number is in the newsletter.

Treasurer: Pat H.-Group Contributions for February 2009 of \$2,335 were down comparable to 2008 and 2007. Group supported expenses for the month exceeded contributions by \$1,369. The Valentines dance also showed a loss of \$747. The bookstore had revenues in the excess of \$594 for the month. Total net loss was \$1,522 and YTD \$620. Operating Reserve remains high because we are just beginning to reinvest in inventory. Sales tax rate increase of 9.25% as of April 1 will affect sales at the bookstore.

Secretary: Connie C.-The February General Meeting minutes published in the April newsletter were approved without changes.

Registrar: Donna L.-Reported that in February there were 347 meetings weekly and we had 174 reps. 47% of groups represented at the February Intergroup general meeting.

Bookstore: Linda M.-ICSC Committee voted to put a barcode scanner into bookstore and it is now in place at the volunteer desk. This will help volunteers be more efficient. The bookstores inventory will take place March 31st at 6:00 pm. Please call if you are interested in helping. All volunteer shifts are filled.

ACCESS SONOMA COUNTY

What is Access Sonoma County all about?

Access Sonoma County is a relatively new AA General Service committee.

In other areas of the country, we might be called a Special Needs Committee; but we have come to believe there are no special needs: We all need to be able to get the message of Alcoholics Anonymous and work the magic of the 12 Steps in our lives. Some people encounter barriers, however; perhaps mobility or diminished hearing, or the need for childcare at meetings.

Access Sonoma County works to identify barriers which may make it difficult for people to get the message of AA and, where possible, provide tools or resources to eliminate or reduce those barriers.

In our brief three-year history, we have worked with groups to be sure that the meeting directory is accurate when it says a meeting is wheelchair accessible. We have researched and published a list of meetings which provide childcare, which are child-friendly, and which don't welcome kids. We offer the Big Book on CD for loan to members who have difficulty with the written copy. We have literature available in languages other than English and Spanish, as part of a service called "A Voice from Home".

At present, we've distributed a blue single-page survey to meetings, in hopes of finding out what members identify as further barriers to involvement in AA. We depend on the honest participation of AA members to guide us in our work, and we welcome attendance at our monthly meeting by anyone who's interested in our work. Our meetings are at the Bookstore on the 2nd Thursday of each month at 6:30pm. Contact phone numbers and emails are on the back page of this newsletter.
