

OFFICER REPORTS

CHAIR: Diane W. She will be unable to attend the 22nd Annual Intergroup/ Central Office/ AAWS Seminar in Oklahoma City, October 4 – 7. Funds for this were approved in May. There was a \$50 expense for postage for Teleservice to mail their new volunteer packets. The Steering Committee voted that Intergroup would be hosting a table at Unity Day next to the Bookstore table. We discussed the two available sites for the Alkathons and which site would serve the fellowship best.

VICE CHAIR: Tim P. He reviewed the material he covers in his new rep meetings at 7:30 before the Intergroup General Meeting monthly.

TREASURER: Larry O. Group contributions continue to be very good. They were \$\$\$\$ in August. The Bookstore made a profit of \$\$\$\$. Expenses were up because of the Teleservice Volunteer Packet project and the Newsletter was larger than normal last month. BOOKSTORE: Gloria P. The Tuesday morning every other week volunteer slot at the Bookstore is available (10-2). They have three new volunteers. Calendars and pocket planners from the Grapevine are in. She has an interesting account of how Intergroups got started.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

ICSC: Pat H. ICSC is having two meetings per month to complete some of the projects they have going. They have prepared a report on the Lifestyle Merchandise inventory to come up with a detailed listing of what we have on hand. Next month Gloria will put into use suggestions on new inventory procedures. Now we have a printout with each inventory item listed.

OUTREACH: Barbara F-K. was absent. There was no report. SEMINARS: Donna L. The 09/15 seminar on 12th stepping was successful. There are no seminars planned for the remainder of this calendar year. Next seminar is in January. The time and day may be changed.

TELESERVICE: Dave R. Live Teleservice volunteers answer phone calls from alcoholics 24/7. They need someone for Thurs 8 – 10am. They need a recording secretary. They meet the 2nd Monday 6pm at the Bookstore.

LIAISON REPORTS

BRIDGING THE GAP: John B. BTG takes people from treatment centers to their first AA meeting. They need volunteers with six months of sobriety, a working knowledge of the steps and a car. They meet the third Tuesday at the Bookstore at 7 pm. Last month they had 23 contact requests, 14 local, 5 outside the district and 4 outside the area. CNCA is having its second annual BTG Forum. It is being held on Saturday, October 20 from 9am to 4pm at the Rutherford Grange on Hwy 29 in Rutherford.

HOSPITALS AND INSTITUTIONS: Mark V. was absent. Laurie E. reported for him. The meeting times for H&I are the first Wed., Santa Rosa Senior Center on Bennett Valley Road, 5:30pm new rep orientation; 6 pm business meeting. Bring a sponsee or friend.

PI/CPC: Nick R. PI/CPC meets the 2nd Wed. at the Santa Rosa City Hall. Last month it was reported they meet at the Senior Center and that was an error. Their job is to distribute AA literature to the general public in Hotels, Police Stations, Libraries, Senior Centers, Hospitals, etc. They need volunteers to distribute literature in the Windsor area.

SOCYPAA: Sean McP. SOCYPAA is for anyone with room to grow. The Bookstore has a supply of updated SOCYPAA meeting schedules. SOCYPAA currently has five young people meetings per week in Sonoma County. Their next event is the Corn Maize at the end of October

ACCESS SONOMA COUNTY: Jamie T. She asked the reps to please turn in their surveys. They will have a table at Unity Day. The Carpenter's Union Hall is handicap accessible. They are compiling a language base for visiting AAs (not including Spanish). Languages currently assembled are Sign, Arabic, Chinese, French, Hungarian, Italian, Portuguese and Russian. They will be taking inventory soon.

GENERAL SERVICE: Lauralyn C. Last month at General Service they discussed the upcoming entries for the District and Area and asked folks to submit inventory questions. Fall Assembly will be held in Watsonville 11/03. Lick and stick October 4 at Faith Lutheran on Newanga. Pizza served.

SPANISH LIAISON: Elvia P. She attended the Spanish Intergroup Meeting. They want to be on our mailing list for activities. They will try to send a liaison from their Intergroup to ours. They want all their meetings to be listed in our meeting schedule.

OLD BUSINESS

Diane W. reported that everyone who volunteered to find volunteers for the September Bookstore inventory came through. The inventory is 09/29 with pizza following.

<u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

Pat H. stated her term is over in November. They need a nominating committee assembled to elect a new candidate. Barbara F., Matthew M. and Jan J. volunteered.

Group feedback and questions on the motion: That Sonoma County Intergroup Fellowship adopt and ratify the Policies and Procedures proposed by the Intergroup Central Service Committee. Gene H. and Pat H., committee members of the ICSC, answered questions about ICSC. A question was asked about why don't we have an external audit as we already have an internal audit. Expense was the answer and we are now trying to get everything in place so if we have an audit we will prevail. Another rep advocated an external audit every three years.

Group Conscience Concerning the pending Policies and Procedures:

One rep talked to his group and no one was interested. Mature and Sober had three concerns: (1) It is not simple/ too complicated; (2) Focus on micro managing; (3) what exactly does "review" mean? Pat H. answered questions of our prudent reserve. She said we need to look at it, possibly yearly, discuss it and decide if it is the right amount. She said about the Policies and Procedures being discussed that a lot of these items were in place in the past but no one has been doing them. The ICSC committee has pulled together items that need to be done from our past newsletters and records. Its not that the ICSC committee made up the list; it is a list of things that should have been done all along. Serenity Fellowship wanted to know which of the items made us compliant. Parts dealing with the Manager review was mentioned. Diane W. said that Gloria has been reviewed every year and has received a raise between 1 and 4%, though we have no records of 2001 or 2002. The policies ask for a written evaluation. Pat H. explained that Section 6321 of the Corporation Codes requires we provide to membership a complete financial statement and beginning and end-of-year comparison. These should be in the newsletter to comply with California law. Another rep said these are our trusted servants. All Policies and Procedures are normal business procedures and we should comply. We are not excluded from such things just because we are a bunch of drunks. We should follow the group conscience. Another rep said we have a fiduciary responsibility. 12 x 12 x 12 Rohnert Park said items 8 and 10 are micromanaging. Pat H. responded we have no intention of micromanaging the Bookstore. Gene H. said we are just making our work simpler by doing this. Another rep said its about being compliant with state regulations and keeps inventory moving well in all categories.

<u>SUMMATION</u>: Tim P. The Alkathons are at the Carpenter's Union Hall on Corby; the steering committee meeting for Alkathons is on 10/10 at Starbuck's Farmers Lane, 7pm; group contributions are good—\$\$\$\$ ahead of last year—the Pirate dance is this Saturday; we sent a liaison to the Spanish Intergroup; we had a long discussion of Policies and Procedures; there have been four articles regarding Policies and Procedures in the Newsletter.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer. Gratefully in Service, Nan B.

A Note From the Chair

At the September Intergroup General meeting, we read from Concept 9: "Good service leaders, together with sound and appropriate methods of choosing them, are at all levels indispensable for our future functioning and safety." Amazingly enough, it is already time to think about how we choose our service leaders for next year.

Beginning at the October meeting, currently-serving officers and committee chairs will share briefly about their service commitments, so that you can begin to think about whether or not you want to be available in January and February when those positions are elected. We will also be publishing "job descriptions" in the newsletter.

There are five officers and six committee chairs, so there is plenty of opportunity for you to think about. Most of these positions have simple qualifications: gratitude, willingness, teachability. The few positions with other suggested pre-requisites will spell them out in the presentations and the newsletter articles.

My experience with service to the Fellowship is that it is always an opportunity for spiritual growth, and usually an exercise in learned humility. Few of us complete a service commitment without making mistakes, few do it as well as we would like to have done, but nobody does it as badly as we were afraid we might.

So please listen closely when your trusted servants share their experience, read the job descriptions carefully, and have some faith if your friends or your sponsor suggests that you – yes, YOU – could serve Intergroup. You just might be amazed.

Languages of the Heart

"Do we have any visitors from outside Sonoma County?"

Our beautiful wine country paradise attracts tens of thousands of visitors every year from all over the world. Some of these are alcoholics seeking recovery through AA. When they attend our meetings, we welcome them; they, in turn, bring fresh perspectives and new "one-liners."

Most visitors speak fluent English or Spanish and can participate easily in our meetings. For those who are less comfortable with our primary languages, Access Sonoma County is preparing a database of members who can speak with visitors or newcomers in their native tongue and have volunteered to do so.

We've had some debate as to how this should be structured and presented, and have decided to keep it simple. So here's the plan:

- If you wish to participate, please give the committee your name, contact information and the language(s) in which you are fluent. Send the information to us through your General Service Representative, or call Susan C.
- A list will be compiled and provided to Teleservice; individuals and meetings can obtain contact information from ASC as the need arises.
- Each volunteer will determine the appropriate level of his or her involvement with the visitor or newcomer. It might consist of a single phone call or extend to sponsorship.
- We suggest that volunteers purchase a copy of the Big Book in their language, if it is available, and have literature on hand – again, if available.

So far, we have volunteers who speaks Arabic, Jordanian, Lebanese, French, Hungarian, Italian, Portuguese and Mandarin Chinese, as well as a member fluent in American Sign Language, and we hope to add many more languages. This is a simple project and costs nothing, yet it could mean everything to an alcoholic who still suffers. Please let us know if you can volunteer to be on the database, or if you have suggestions.

Did you know? The Big Book is printed in 39 languages: Afrikaans, Arabic, Armenian, Bulgarian, Chinese, Croatian, Czech, Danish, Dutch/Flemish, Filipino (Tagalog), Finnish, German, Greek, Hungarian, Icelandic, Italian, Japanese, Khmer, Korean, Latvian, Lithuanian, Mongolian, Nepali, Norwegian, Persian, Polish, Portuguese, Romanian, Russian, Slovak, Slovene, Swahili, Swedish, Thai, Turkish, Ukranian, Urdu, Vietnamese and Zulu.

SOCYPAA (Sonoma County Young People In AA) just finished our elections. We have a GREAT group this year.


By the time you are reading this, we will have just had our 2nd annual Children of The Corn Maze event. I can tell you that last year's event was one of our best, so I'm sure
