#### MESSAGE FROM THE SCIF CHAIR

Below is a summary of the Intergroup / Central Office / AAWS / AAGV seminar I attended. I had the opportunity to be present at many different workshops on a wide assortment of topics. The format for the workshops was that one speaker talked about the topic for around 10 minutes, then they opened it up to the room to discuss what happens in their group. The workshops lasted 1.5 hours a piece. Some of the workshops I went to were: Teleservice, Paid Employees and Their Responsibilities, The Sale of AA Literature, and Requirements for AA Meetings to be Listed in Meeting Schedules. I also spoke with other Central Office / Intergroup office managers to see how their fellowships operate. SCIF is smaller than some of the other fellowships, like Oakland Intergroup and San Francisco Intergroup, but I believe we can still have a lot to learn from these groups. A majority of the other people in attendance were full-time paid employees for their fellowship.

In reference to Teleservice, most of the other fellowships have their phone service run out of the central office / bookstore while they are open. When the office is closed they use a call forwarding service to transfer the phones to volunteers. Using a call forwarding service through the phone company allows there group to save the cost of an answering service.

The seminar on Paid Employees discussed how a majority of the office managers help out in all aspects of the central office. Included is a list of some of their job responsibilities, but please remember that these are full-time employees. They are listed as: having active participation in all business and steering committee meetings, signers on the checking account, monthly bookkeeping, paying the bills, overseeing meeting schedule changes, overseeing the newsletters, and they also have a vote.

The Sale of AA Literature was an interesting seminar. It described how different groups operate in different ways. Some groups only sold literature published by AA World Service, they did not even sell sobriety chips. Other groups only sold AA approved literature and sobriety chips. Then there were groups that sold literature that the members in their area requested.

The seminar on AA Meetings Listed in the Meeting Schedule mainly dealt with the criteria for how to list meetings in the meeting schedule. It seemed like every area was a bit different depending on what worked best for that specific area.

Another great part of the seminar was speaking with office managers from different Intergroups. I talked extensively with Maury, the office manager of San Francisco, and Steve the office manager of Oakland. My conversation with them gave me an opportunity to see what other groups are doing in the area.

In Closing I would like to thank the SCIF intergroup representatives for sending me to the Intergroup / Central office seminar in St. Louis Missouri, I greatly appreciated the opportunity to attend. From what I have taken back from the seminar in the upcoming months I may be bringing some possible long term changes for Sonoma County Intergroup Fellowship to the ICSC, and Steering committee meetings.

#### Officer Reports:

**Chair**: (Sean McP.) went to conference in St. Lois, very interesting. Met and talked with the managers of San Francisco and Oakland. We have 40-48% participation from our groups; most places only 30-33%.

**Vice Chair:** (Doug S.) Talked to Sean while he was in St. Lois. I think one of the reasons we have high participation is that we only meet from 8-9 and then we're done. Reminder- if you're giving a report, please come up and use the chairs.

**Recording Secretary:** (Siobhan S.) August minutes were accepted.

**Treasurer**: (Shirley J.) Group contributions of \$4,230 improved for the month of August more than previous year by \$2,345. Group supported expenses exceeded income by \$30, Bookstore expenses exceeded income by \$1,317, and Seminar income is \$57, resulting in a \$1,292 net loss overall.

**Registrar**: (Rich S.) In August we had 356mtgs/week, 148 reps, for 41% group representation

**Bookstore Report:** (Linda M.) Book prices will be going up on Monday Oct 4. New price list available next Monday. 3rd quarter inventory was held yesterday afternoon, and went very well, no big discrepancies. Daylight Savings Time takes effect on Sunday, Nov. 7th, and we will go to winter hours, with the bookstore closing at 5pm Mon-Thurs until next March. There is a volunteer opening on alternate Monday afternoons..

#### **BRIDGING THE GAP**

"Bridging the Gap" or "The A A Buddy System"

Bridging the Gap (BTG) is a sub-committee of General Service whose AA member volunteers take people newly released from treatment facilities to their first AA meeting. Individuals are matched by sex, age, and zip code so the newcomer feels welcome at a meeting convenient to their needs.

Just by volunteering on a phone list you can make a big difference to a newcomer one-on-one. If you're going to a meeting anyway why not take someone with you? This is a great service commitment that is fairly infrequent (last month we had about 30 newcomer contact requests).

Want to get more involved than just being on the phone list? Please come to the BTG monthly business meeting at the Bookstore the 3rd Tuesday of each month (new rep orientation 6:00pm/meeting 6:30-7:30). We need volunteers to present the BTG program (and show the new "Hope" video) as we expand our outreach to more facilities. We have other committee positions available as well. You can be of service with BTG at 6 months sobriety (2 years sobriety needed for jail clearance).

BTG is a great way to get involved and stay in the middle doing 12th Step work; meeting new people, sharing our experience, strength and hope.

Through BTG I brought my first newcomer to a meeting back in November 2009. She and I still see each other at least once a week at a womens' meeting and have become friends in our recovery; a joy I wouldn't have experienced without volunteering for BTG!


