



GENERAL SERVICE

As I write this article today, fires continue to burn across Sonoma County. I pray that the fires will be put out, and we will be able to begin the process of recovery by the time the Intergroup Newsletter is published and you find yourself reading this.

The scope of the tragedy that has befallen our community defies description. I personally know at least six people who have lost their homes and most of their possessions, and no one within my circle of experience has not been either directly affected, or knows someone who has been directly affected.

There are days and weeks and months of adversity ahead of us.

The week after the fires began found me working on helping my family, friends, neighbors and customers recover from devastating losses, and I find myself reflecting on how my personal recovery, through the program of Alcoholics Anonymous, allows me to be of service to my fellow human being, alcoholic or not. Without this program, I would have had no ability to look beyond myself. Chapter Seven of the Big Book reminds me, "Assuming we are spiritually fit, we can do all sorts of things alcoholics are not supposed to do."

While trying to be mindful of Tradition Five, which states, "Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers," and at the risk of taking quotes, which primarily concern themselves with the program of recovery from alcoholism, out of context, I'm finding solace and inspiration in our literature.

From Chapter 7 of the Big Book – "Working with Others" we read, "Helping others is the foundation stone of your recovery," and "Follow the dictates of a Higher Power and you will presently live in a new and wonderful world, no matter what your present circumstances!"

In page 77 of the Big Book from the chapter "Into Action" we read "Our real purpose is to fit ourselves to be of

maximum service to God and the people about us."

In Step Three of the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions we are told: "The more we become willing to depend upon a Higher Power, the more independent we actually are. Therefore dependence, as A.A. practices it, is really a means of gaining true independence of the spirit."

The Seventh Step Prayer from page 76 of the Big Book reads:

"My Creator, I am now willing that you should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows. Grant me strength, as I go out from here, to do your bidding. Amen."

Please let Sonoma County General Service know if your group needs assistance with restocking literature, as we have resources locally and from the New York General Service Office to help with this.

I pray that each and every one of you, my brothers and sisters, can soon find yourselves in a better place.

OFFICERS REPORTS:

Chair: (Barry D.) Thank you to Debbie for putting together the play. Please talk to your groups about our need for a treasurer.

Vice Chair: (James C.) We had nine new reps tonight at the meeting.

Secretary: (Patrick B.) Minutes from August business meeting were passed.

Treasurer: (Carolyn A.) Group contributions for August 2017 were \$4,474 plus \$1 interest from the bank, for a total of \$4,475, which was \$1,831 less than August of last year (2016). After expenses we had a net profit of \$959. Bookstore income for August 2017 was \$7,657, and after expenses we had a net profit of \$115. Overall, we had a net gain of \$1,073 for the month of August, 2017. Year to date we are \$4,330 behind where we were last year (August, 2016).

Registrar: (Linda W.) As of today's date, there are 239 groups in Sonoma County offering 359 meetings each week. There are 159 meeting representatives on record, for 66.5% participation. There were 78 representatives attending the August 2017 General Meeting, for 49% participation There were 3 new reps attending the August 2017 meeting, as well as 5 others who identified themselves as new reps.

BOOKSTORE REPORT: (Glenn C.) Sale book for October is "Emotional Sobriety I" (this was out of print for awhile); \$12.99 is the regular price, sale price is \$10.39 plus tax. A new Grapevine book "Voices of Women in AA" will be in stock at the bookstore in October.

ICSC: (Esther S.) Still working on insurance options for SCIF. Thank you to Mike K. for reviewing policy options.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Activities: (Debbie J.) The play was a big success with a profit of \$600. The next event will be the Halloween dance on October 28th.

Alkathons: (Jared T., Amber H.) Alkathon lottery will be held after this meeting, and the 11th and 25th are the dates for the next planning meetings.

BRIDGING THE GAP

I was first introduced to Bridging the Gap (BTG) while I was in a treatment center last year. A lovely woman from BTG came to our facility dutifully every month right smack in the middle of her Sunday afternoon (I often wondered why she would give up her Sunday afternoons to come talk to us!). This woman shared with us her experience, strength and hope, and told us about the BTG Program. She said it connects people in residential treatment (like us), hospitals, or jails with an A.A. contact of the same gender to take them to their first A.A. meeting out of treatment. She handed us all little blue cards to fill out our contact information if we were interested in using the service. I remember always looking forward to that lady coming back every month because she always seemed so happy.

Fast forward, almost a year later, and I hear about a service commitment opening for BTG. So, I attended the next business meeting and was elected the Female Phone List Coordinator. So, now I get to connect the women coming out of treatment with the A.A. volunteers who will take them to their first meeting! It has been so incredibly rewarding and heartwarming to see the passion our A.A. volunteers have for helping the newcomer. And the women coming out of treatment are so grateful! This commitment really is a blessing.

Also, guess who I get to see every month at the BTG business meeting? It's that same sweet lady that came in and presented at my treatment facility, still happy and smiling, bringing the message of hope to newcomers on her Sunday afternoons. It's nice when things come full circle.

We are always looking for volunteers. Come to our business meeting on the 3rd Tuesday of the month at the bookstore at 6 pm to see how you can be of service!
