GET SOBER, GET CHEAP

I don't know about you, but I spent hundreds of dollars every month on booze. I bought beer and whiskey on a daily basis for over 30 years. I know that adds up to thousands of dollars over the years.

When I was drinking, I'd throw money around—I thought I was a millionaire. I'd just give money away, writing checks to charities. I'd put them in the mail, and not know I did it until I got my bank statement the next month! Needless to say, I bounced so many checks, the charities quit sending me solicitation letters and the bank asked me to take my business elsewhere. It made me feel important to give money away, and I always let people know how generous I was! I was forever talking about the charities I helped.

When I came to AA and got sober, my finances were a mess. I was broke—mostly from missing so much work without pay—and it was an awful realization. An old-timer told me to put whatever I could afford into the basket when it was passed.

July 2004 minutes were reviewed & approved with the following corrections under New Reps: "Ron from Saturday Morning Beginners" and under H&I: "Business meeting occurs at 6:15PM."

Registrar: Deborah shared new sign-in forms and is investigating integrating data on computer.

LIAISON REPORTS

General Service: Donna K. attended the Summer Assembly in at a beautiful new lodge on the Eel River in Fortuna, CA. There were 334 folks in attendance, and a Class A non-alcoholic trustee as one of the speakers. GS is preparing for possible vote on 2 motions on the floor at the area level that your General Service reps should be discussing: 1. Producing a pamphlet for the non-theist and 2. Looking into the cost of getting professional translation from English to Spanish and vise versa for GS monthly meetings and each of the 4 assemblies per year. Gearing up for rotation with elections in Watsonville on October 30th, and our District Elections will be on November 1st. PRAASA registration forms for Canada 2005 are available on

H&I: Mark reported NCAA will occur in Yuba City on October 1st-3rd, and the 33rd Annual will occur in Galt on April 22nd-24th, 2005.

PI/CPC: Dave R reported that they distribute literature throughout the County and participate in a dozen or so DUI classes per month, including multiple offender and youth offender DUI classes. PICPC meets on the 2nd Wednesday of each month at 7^{pm}, and they have a need for young speakers for presentations at schools.

Bridging the Gap: Carolyn A. explained that BTG matches people exiting from treatment programs with AA volunteers to take them to their first meeting. To volunteer, you need 6 mos. sober and working knowledge of the steps. They had 15 local requests and 19 out-of-district requests for BTG services last month.

OFFICER REPORTS

Intergroup Chair: Kay S. indicated that Craig puts a lot of effort into making events attractive to as many folks as possible and that she would like to see more folks at activities and that children are welcome. Kay relayed that she will not be in attendance next month.

Vice Chair: Steve B. oriented 6 new reps, one from a new group. He reminded everyone that the new rep orientation occurs at 7:30PM before the general meeting.

Treasurer Report: John S. reviewed the financial report on page 7 of the newsletter and indicated that, as usual for this time of year, we are behind by \$2,500 and usually catch up by end of the year. John then deferred to Colin who expressed concern that he was hearing Intergroup reps giving misleading SCIF financial reports to their groups including misinformation about who should donate how much money into the basket when it is passed at a meeting. Colin suggested that groups bring their old newsletters to the bookstore to recycle them and to take less to begin with so as to discourage waste. Bob K. then gave a detailed but clear explanation of the financial report that is printed in the newsletter each month as well as the balance sheet and



the last big holiday that went by; I will finish this column in pirate talk.



Please join us for our next monthly business meeting on Monday, October 4, 2004, at 7:30PM. The AA service manual study is at 6:45pm and new GSR orientation 7PM. We would also love to see you at the Fall Assembly in Watsonville! Take care until then!



At first, it was tough to put anything in; I was just beginning to get to work 5 days a week and pull out of the financial hole I'd put myself while in my drunken stupor for 30 years. But I made the effort because I was told that it was important.

The old-timers told me that it was important to put money in the basket because we are self-supporting through our own contributions. That means we don't get grants or take out loans to keep the doors open, and that it is up to the individual member of AA to contribute in order to keep the doors open for the new guy. They told me that one of the responsibilities that comes with sobriety is to support AA financially, to ensure that the message of AA can continue to be carried to the still-suffering alcoholic. At first, I put money into the basket just because I was told to, plus I was afraid people would think badly of me if I simply let the basket pass by me.

For many years now, I've put my dollar in the basket as it passes by me. But recently I went to a restaurant for breakfast. I wasn't really hungry so I ordered coffee and a cream stick—they advertised Krispy Kream! I was shocked when I got my billit was for \$2.37! Plus, they only gave me one free refill on my coffee! It hit me then: All those years I've been going to AA meetings eating donuts, drinking as much coffee as I wanted, and putting a measly buck into the basket. Oh no, I had gotten sober and cheap! It was a terrible realization, and I was momentarily ashamed of myself. That old saying immediately came to mind: "How grateful are you?"

I'm glad to say, I quickly rectified the situation by putting two bucks into the basket at each meeting I attended from then on. I go to 5 meetings a week; that's only 10 bucks aweek I'm giving to a program that saved may life and taught me a way of life that brings me immeasurable happiness on a daily basis. How grateful am I? I'm grateful enough to do my part in supporting AA by putting two bucks into the basket!
