OFFICER REPORTS:

Chair: (Holly H.) A big kudos to everyone on the Bookstore Redo Committee, and especially Tom F. as he really pulled everything together. The bookstore has been painted, and several people donated time as well as effort to make some small cosmetic improvements that make a huge difference. Come check it out! Please remember that the Alkathon lottery will be held directly following the General Meeting in September. PI/CPC

PI/CPC Speaks to Non-alcoholic Groups about A.A. Public Information and Cooperation with the Professional Community has two basic functions. We give presentations to groups who are not familiar with our program and we distribute A.A. literature throughout the professional community. We speak mainly to DUI classes and high school classes but also to anyone who requests us such as unions, police departments, businesses, and medical professionals. We go in teams, usually a male and a female. One of us tells the group about the program, explains that we are not affiliated with any other entity, how to use a meeting schedule, and provides a framework of reference to anyone who may need us or knows someone who does. The other speaker shares their experience, strength and hope, as we would in a meeting, telling their story. We avoid A.A. jargon, trying to imagine someone is hearing about us for the first time. We usually present for at least an hour.

We deliver meeting schedules and A.A. pamphlets to libraries, hospitals, clinics and doctors' offices, police departments, treatment facilities, homeless shelters, and senior centers. Currently we deliver literature to 32 locations. The money for this literature comes from your group's contributions to General Service.

Anyone interested in PI/CPC can attend our community meeting the 2nd Wednesday at 7:30 pm in the city hall underground employee lounge at 1st and D streets. Two years of sobriety plus a working knowledge of the steps is required. We are always looking for young people to speak to high schools.
