

SONOMA COUNTY INTERGROUP FELLOWSHIP GENERAL MEETING

July 26th 2010

Officer Reports:

Chair: (Sean Mc) During the last few months we have been using up some of our prudent reserve. It normally takes around \$4,000 to pay for group supported expenses which include Teleservice, meeting schedules, and newsletters. In May the group contributions were \$1,397, and in June they were \$1,670 to total \$3,067. This is roughly \$5000 less than is needed to support SCIF. Also group contributions did not meet expenses in January (\$530), February (\$824), March (\$380), or April (\$305), to total \$2,039 during those four months. SCIF's current prudent reserve is set at \$\$37,226, and it is currently at \$27,493. So is it time to sound the alarms (?), I don't think so, but it is definitely something we should all keep a close eye on. It may be a good time for your group to look at its financials and if you have excess over your prudent reserve now may be a good time to contribute to the different service entities. If group contributions continue to not meet the group supported expenses we will have to cut back on services provided.

Vice Chair: (Doug S) we want to encourage Group Rep sharing at the end of the meeting in order to exchange information. I would like everyone to be mindful of the time.

Recording Secretary: (Siobhan S) June minutes were accepted as printed

Treasurer: (Shirley J) Group contributions of \$1,670 were VERY disappointing in June, more than \$2,150 less than June 2009. Group supported expenses exceeded contributions by \$2,322, bookstore income exceeded expenses by \$61, and Activities expenses exceeded income by \$200, Seminar expenses (at this point) is \$20, resulting in a \$2481 net loss overall.

Note: July contributions are encouraging!

Registrar: (Rich S) In June we had 356mtgs/week, 178 reps, for 48% group representation

Bookstore Report: (Linda M) I am sad to report that the Bookstore was broken into last weekend. The only blessing in this is that the thieves did not do any damage to our inventory and they were only able to take the small amount of cash that we keep on hand to operate the volunteer sales desk and the bookstore donations that we use to pay for the annual volunteer holiday party. So with this and Bob's passing I can't say that I have enjoyed the last few days.

All of us at the bookstore will miss Bob not only because he is a past Chair of Intergroup and was a Bookstore volunteer for the first two years that e worked as manager, but also because he used to drop by with donuts and chat with us about one morning a week. Bob was a good guy and was pretty funny sometimes too, so I am going to miss him.

ICSC: (Steve B) The bookstore did alright (+\$61.). The ICSC committee mainly keeps an eye on the business side of the bookstore.

Alkathons: (Patty G) The Alkathons will be at the Community Church of Christ, W. Steele and Range.

Communications/Newsletter: (Brian Z) let your groups know what's in the newsletter. Events, plug your group, letters to the editor, tell a story, and draw a cartoon, all submissions welcome.

Outreach: (DeeDee S) NP/NR

Seminars: (Karen M) This Wednesday at the 6:30. Anonymity on the Internet. Now at the Comm. Church and paying rent, so we will be passing the basket. I have CDs of the last Seminar, suggested donation of \$2.

General Service: (Annie T) Sonoma County General Service holds a monthly business meeting on the first Monday at 7:30 PM. We meet at the Faith Lutheran Church, and both a new GSR Orientation and a Concept Study start at 6:45 PM.

Because of the generous contribution from Intergroup earlier this year, our District Officers have recently presented a couple of new motions. In May, we introduced a motion to purchase a laptop, for use by our District Officers, primarily our District Registrar. GSRs began reporting back on the laptop motion at our July 12th meeting, where we also presented a second motion. Hopefully, you have already heard about both motions from your GSRs. They will

be sharing information with our groups, and getting your feedback, a group conscience, that they will report back to our District, and then eventually will participate in a vote on behalf of our groups.

The newest motion reads: That District 12 purchase a Portable Sound System, 2 FM Transmitters and a Wireless Microphone System, not to exceed \$1600, and form an Interpretation and Translation Standing Committee.

If this motion passes, District 12 would no longer need to borrow Intergroup's PA system for our Agenda Topics Workshop, or any other event. We have also had an ongoing concern regarding the space where our monthly District business meeting is held (the Faith Lutheran Church on Newanga). Often, the room is full, and if we ever need to move to a larger venue, we already anticipate we will need to be prepared with a sound system.

We would also be able to provide Spanish translation, and would no longer depend on borrowing the Area's equipment – California Northern Coastal Area. We are acutely aware that the Area translation equipment that is available for loan to all the 22 Districts within the Area, is old and breaking down, and will soon no longer be available to any of us.

Our Access Sonoma County Sub-Committee has identified a need for assisted listening in Sonoma County, and with this proposed equipment, all that would be needed to hear proceedings clearly would be an FM radio.

We also hope to form an Interpretation & Translation standing committee to store, operate and maintain the equipment, and to facilitate these services District wide. I want to emphasize, because of the Intergroup contribution earlier this year to Sonoma County General Service, we have been carefully assessing the local General Service needs along with our commitment to sending on any excess funds to our Area. We have set aside the Intergroup contribution separately from our usual budget, until we are sure we have addressed all and any needs. Because of our groups, we have still been able to fund our normal District activities and costs, maintain our Prudent Reserve, and still send 2,000 to the Area after the 1st Qtr of this year.

Sonoma County has a long history of being very generous with our Area, both through our groups directly, and from our Sonoma County General Service, when excess funds are available. And earlier this year, we know our Intergroup also sent our Area a large contribution, at the same time one was sent to our District, and to GSO. However, this economy is affecting all of us, and it is clearly being demonstrated in the decrease of group contributions to all layers of our service structure. Intergroup has reported contributions are down; we certainly beginning to feel it in Sonoma County General Service, and there is recent concern for our Area.

We have a spiritual tradition and principle of not accumulating A.A. funds for unspecified purposes beyond a prudent reserve. If your group is able to, or continue with, supporting all these service entities that make 12th Step work possible, I encourage all of us to

continue to support our 7th Tradition baskets. Have those important conversations with our group treasurers. Be aware of where our contributions are coming from, and where they go. It benefits us all to be accountable to our Fellowship.

BTG: (Felecia S) BTG is a great way to get into service, even if you don't have a lot of sobriety time. We always need help.

The committee meets on the third Thursday of each month at the bookstore.

PI/CPC: (Nick R) Article in the newsletter. We try to explain to people what AA is and isn't. We take mtgs schedules, Big Books and speakers anywhere we are invited. Must have 2yrs to speak for PI/CPC.

Access Sonoma County: (Damiana R) Still getting feedback from the workshop. The biggest concern was the lack of time devoted to solutions, some discussion of this raised the possibility of a "part 2". Last month the comm. talked about creating a local pamphlet, Dual Dx & AA in So. Co. Since the packets handed out at the workshop were such a hit, we voted to stick with that format.

In September we will be doing a group inventory.




TAKE A HIKE!
