Chair: (Holly H.) Intergroup has some exciting things going on right now. The bookstore has updated their POS system, which should make things run more smoothly all the way around. Our Communications Chair/Newsletter Editor Audrey Scully has stepped down. We will miss Audrey, and I would like to thank her for her service. We are looking for someone to fill this position tonight, so please consider making yourself available. Copies of the job description available on the table. We have the Alkathon forms, and they are also available at the bookstore. Linda W. has graciously volunteered to help facilitate the Alkathon lottery again this year. If your meeting would like to host one or more of the Alkathon meetings, you would fill out the form, and your Intergroup Rep or another representative from your meeting brings the form to the SCIF General Meeting on September 28th. The lottery will take place directly following the September General Meeting. ICSC voting tonight. Ryn elected new member.

ADJOURNMENT: The meeting adjourned at 8:40 p.m. with the Responsibility Statement.

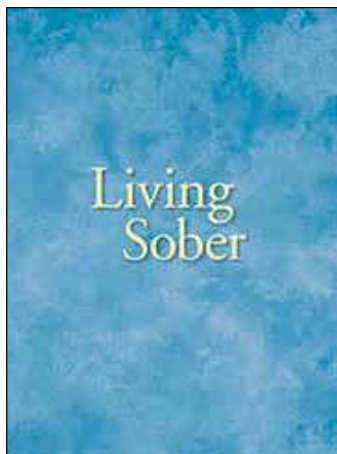

BRIDGING THE GAP

I am the men’s telephone coordinator for Bridging the Gap. Sometimes it is not convenient to make calls and I don’t feel like it, but I always feel better after making Bridging the Gap calls.

One of the most difficult parts about being an alcoholic is that I can slip into self-will, self-centeredness and self-pity without even knowing it. At one point in the day I am connected and focusing on others and feeling really positive. Then, an hour or two later, I am down in the dumps. It all feels so real and so absolute when I am in it. Things just aren’t working out. People just don’t understand. Some mornings, no matter how much prayer and meditation I do, everything just looks hopeless. It feels like there is no God and my alcoholism and sobriety are a cruel joke.

What can I do to get out of this funk when it gets this bad? Making BTG calls (or doing some other service) always helps me. It never feels like it will before I do it. My brain will say to me “Oh, why bother? I have so much else I have got to do.” But some deeper part of me knows the truth. It is by my actions that I am saved, not by my thoughts and feelings. So I pick up the phone and I make the calls. Then the most amazing thing happens. I not only feel better, but the dark funk completely disappears, as though it never existed. I am reminded of that line in the Big Book where Bill recognizes that Ebby has been taken from the “the scrap heap to a level of life better than the best he had ever known”. Being directly involved in service gives me that feeling all over again.

I guess this is why I hear people say at meetings that I have to act my way into a new way of thinking and feeling rather than the other way around. This is how I know the program is saving my life: because I would never think of taking these actions on my own. I’m just not built that way. It is also a great reminder of why we do service, especially reaching out to help the newcomer: it is to save myself.

This program is powerful stuff. Simple, but powerful.

Once, I embarrassed myself by entirely failing to make a parent feel welcome in an A.A. meeting. A particular Saturday night meeting has always been very important to me, the kind that draws in people who are out late who need a meeting, without a lot of old-timers around, giving me opportunities to step up in service early in my sobriety. One night, a mom came in with two kids, but I didn't see that they were together, so I was a little indelicate when I asked who the unattended children were in the back of the room. She was already having a bad night, felt unwelcome, grabbed them, and stormed out of the room. Thankfully, someone in the meeting went after her and they talked a long time in the parking lot, and I saw this mom (with her kids) again next week. Since then, we've become friends.

Have you formed a group conscience on whether your meetings are child-friendly or child-tolerant? Talk about it in your steering committee, and let us know at asc@sonomacountyaa.org so we can share that information more widely. Do your secretaries know what to do if a parent comes in with a child? What about a disruptive child? And remember: you can always be the one to put out your hand if someone leaves a meeting feeling unwelcome.

PI/CPC NEWS

A.A. Presentations at Local Schools

Public Information and Cooperation with the Professional Community provides a number of informational tasks as a form of Twelfth Step work. We speak at DUI classes, provide literature to hospitals, police stations, libraries, senior centers, jails and other governmental institutions. We also provide literature packets to doctors and clergy who may be the first to have contact with an alcoholic before Alcoholics Anonymous would be an option for recovery.

One of the functions of PI/CPC is to do presentations at Sonoma County schools.

We typically give our presentations to freshmen in High School in a life skills class or what I had as a freshman called health education.

A presentation consists of one person giving the students a general overview of what A.A. is and isn't in an informational manner. We then have a young speaker tell their story of what it was like, what happened and what it is like today much like we do at meetings, keeping in mind that there may be only a couple of potential alcoholics in the class and for most of the students this will be information that they can take with them as they go through their life.

We are currently trying to expand the number of schools we present to and are in need of additional young speakers. Young would be defined as anyone in their thirties and younger. The sobriety requirement is two years.

This is a unique experience and I would encourage those interested to come to speaker training at 7:00 p.m. and then stick around for our regular business meeting at 7:30 p.m. We meet the second Wednesday of the month at Santa Rosa City Hall adjacent to the lower parking area.
