PI/CPC Committee Share

How many times have you heard in a meeting "I never knew what AA was before I got here" or even "I'd never even heard of AA before my doctor suggested/the judge ordered it"? Had you yourself heard of AA or knew what AA could/couldn't do prior to arriving here? Part of what PI/CPC does is to get the word out. That cumbersome acronym stands for Public Information and Cooperation with the Professional Community. (Now you know why we need the acronym)

Every late Summer and Winter PI/CPC is contacted by anywhere from between three to six of our county schools. "It's time for Human Interaction class again! Will you please come do some presentations?" Those requests get funneled to me, the Schools Coordinator. It's the best, most gratifying service commitment there is. I soon find myself occupied in a flurry of phone calls and texts, coordinating our speakers and their availability with the schools' respective calendars and class periods.

In the first quarter, 24 AA members were in service by carrying the message to over 400 students. 400 KIDS!! Sometimes on Zoom, sometimes in person. Being a speaker at schools is also, many will say, the very best, most gratifying service opportunity there is.

WE NEED SPEAKERS! Attend our easy, short training on Zoom or by phone, observe a presentation, then you are ready to speak at your own presentation. Your name and number are added to our Speaker List along with your general availability and preferences (like "days only" or "Mon-Thurs only", etc) and then someone like me eventually calls on you. And there's no pressure! If the stars align and your availability matches a school's need, you've got yourself a speaking slot! Our members are always present in pairs. It's ridiculously easy and enormously rewarding. There are other opportunities for speaking such as DUI classes and more.

Recent feedback/questions from the kids included:

- "It was surprising to learn how young some people are when they become an alcoholic." *Thank you for sharing your story.
- *I think it was really brave of you guys to share your stories and talk to us about AA! *My dad has warned me and my sister that his side of the family kind of struggles with alcoholism.
- *Thank you for informing us about AA.

I know many of us come to believe that it "takes what it takes" but do you ever wonder what your story might be like had someone carried the message to you in high school?



General Service: Your Voice is Important

Throughout the world, individuals, like you, help AA Groups carry the message of Alcoholics Anonymous and the Twelve Steps to sick and suffering alcoholics- offering hope, help, and a new way of life. And the message of each individual in each AA group also has a direct voice on the direction of AA as a whole. This is through the AA General Service Organization.

In July of 1950 at the First International Convention in Cleveland, Ohio, it was decided to "try" the General Service Conference Idea. This proposal came from our founders, Dr. Bob and Bill W. The reasons behind this included the realization that the two of them "could not last forever," recognition that the AA trustees would need future guidance from AA itself, and the need to ensure the recovery of the alcoholic who still stumbles outside of our rooms. We needed it to provide a permanent haven for all alcoholics in the ages ahead so that they can find the rebirth that brought us back to life.

The conference works through a system of committees and delegates representing the United States and Canada. The ideas or proposals, which they meet on annually to discuss come from individuals and home groups, who bring it through their General Service Representative to the district meeting and their area for discussion and possibly a vote to pass it on to the conference. The conference works to keep OUR group conscience alive and well in AA as a whole.

This process is the gift, or legacy, of Dr. Bob and Bill W. to our fellowships. It is demonstrated in our AA Triangle, with the groups being the final authority in the process. It was adopted after a five year trial period in 1955. The "Resolution" states that "The Fellowships have assumed the guardianship of AA's Twelve Traditions and World Services."

So, as members of AA today, we can be very busy and overwhelmed at times. But our voice, your voice, is needed. We have been given an amazing gift and we want to ensure our fellowships are aware of this gift. We all hope members will be able to participate in the group sharing sessions that are held at our fellowships each March and April. Please share your thoughts and opinions on a variety of topics that will be brought to the annual General Service Conference, the end of April, by our Northern California Coastal Area Delegate.

BRIDGING THE GAP

Statement of Purpose

Bridging the Gap is a General Service sub-committee that supports that very important first step for alcoholics who have just been released from a hospital, treatment center or correctional facility. By providing a temporary contact, Bridging the Gap helps newcomers make the transition to Alcoholics Anonymous in his or her home community.

Members of Alcoholics Anonymous, usually in pairs, meet the patients or inmates after release and accompany them to their first A.A. meeting. As in all 12-step work, this activity is strictly voluntary.

We are always looking for volunteers to fill our phone list. We try to have a volunteer available who is someone around their age and gender, who lives in their neighborhood, who can meet them at the volunteer's home group, introduce them to the fellowship and make them feel welcome and at home. It is usually a one-time commitment, and as in all 12-step work, should be done in pairs. To be a volunteer, it is suggested that you have at least 6 months sobriety and a working knowledge of the twelve steps.

TREASURER: [Meghan L.] Central Office income for January 2022 includes \$7,140.00 from Group Contributions, \$272.00 from individuals and \$75.00 for group insurance for a total of \$7,487.00. Total expenses for January include \$2,329.00 from central office, \$200.00 from newsletter and \$59 from Teleservice for a subtotal gain of \$4,899.00. The Bookstore income for January 2022 was \$4,300.00. Total expenses were \$5,574.00 for the bookstore leaving a subtotal loss of \$1,274.00. Overall, for this month we had a net gain of \$3,699.00. Year to date our income is \$11,862.00, our expenses are \$8,163.00, leaving a gain of \$3,699.00

INTERGROUP TREASURER'S REPORT - FEBRUARY 2022

Central Office income for February 2022 includes \$1,224.00 from Group Contributions, \$20.00 from individuals and \$25.00 for group insurance for a total of \$1,269.00.

Total expenses for February include \$2,162.00 from central office and \$58 from Teleservice for a subtotal loss of \$951.00.

The Bookstore income for February 2022 was \$5,324.55 and \$25.00 for group insurance. Total expenses were 6,121.00 for the bookstore leaving a subtotal loss of \$771.00.

Overall, for this month we had a net loss of \$1,722.00. Year to date our income is \$18,480.00, our expenses are \$16,503.00, leaving a gain of \$1,977.00.
